Europe & India to work together to shape a new global order: EU chief

Key outcomes include 5-year comprehensive strategic agenda, mobility pact

AS NEW Delhi hosted leaders from the European Union on the occasion of India's 77th Republic Day celebrations, European Commission President Ursula von der Leyen said a "successful India makes the world more stable, prosperous and secure".

European Council President Antonio Luis Santos da Costa and von der Leyen were the chief guests at the Republic Day function on Monday. Thanking President Droupadi Murmu for hosting them, von der Leyen said, "Europe and India are the world's largest democracies, committed to working together to shape a new global order. This is why we are here to take our partnership to new heights."

As the two European leaders co-chair the EU-India Summit along with Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Tuesday, the key outcomes include announcements about a 'comprehensive strategic agenda for 2026-2030', conclusion of a Free Trade Agreement (FTA) on Tuesday.

Conclusion of talks on FTA set to be announced today; pact later this year

New Delhi, January 26

COMMERCE SECRETARY Rajesh Agarwal said on Monday that official-level negotiations are being wrapped up and both sides are set to announce the successful conclusion of talks on a Free Trade Agreement (FTA) on Tuesday.

This assumes significance as the trade deal has been de-

ades in the making — the talks first started in 2007 but were abandoned in 2013 due to differences in market access for automobiles.

While the two sides are expected to announce the conclusion of negotiations at the India-EU Summit here on Tuesday, the formal signing would take place later this year after legal scrubbing of the agreement is completed.

"After subsuming a few chapters, India and the EU have completed talks on 21 chapters. While the legal scrubbing of the deal would take four to five months, the trade deal will come into effect by early next year after being ratified by the European Parliament," an official said.

The trade agreement is expected to be among the most comprehensive deals that India

Top China general removed for 'leaking' n-plan to US: Report

A DAY after top Chinese military general Zhang Youxia was reported to be under official investigation, *The Wall Street Journal* reported Sunday that he was accused of "leaking information about the country's nuclear weapons program to the US", among other allegations.

The extraordinary charge marks a milestone in China's ongoing purge of allegedly corrupt military officials, which has expanded in scope and depth over the past three years. Zhang, 75, is the most senior

Age rating to list of don'ts: Draft rules on obscenity online

THE CENTRE is looking at introducing draft rules to address obscenity in online content, *The Indian Express* has learnt. Besides drawing some red lines — attacks on religions or communities, inciting people, false and suggestive innuendos, among others — the draft IT (Digital Code) Rules, 2026, proposes the classification of all digital content by age suitability.

Last March, the Supreme

Court had asked the Solicitor General to draft proposals safeguarding free speech under Article 19(1)(a) of the Constitution while ensuring the constitutionally permissible "reasonable restrictions" under Article 19(2). This came in the backdrop of public backlash against social media influencers Ranveer Allahbadia and Samay Raina over their comments. The case is scheduled to be heard on January 29.

Air quality ‘poor’ again, rain expected today

New Delhi: After two days of slight respite, Delhi’s air quality slipped back to the ‘Poor’ category, with the city logging an AQI of 241 Monday against Sunday’s 153 when the air quality was ‘Moderate’. In Noida, AQI deteriorated from 120 on Sunday to 219 on Monday. Gurgaon’s AQI rose from 198 on Sunday to 276 on Monday.

While rain is expected to bring temporary relief on Tuesday, Delhi is set to return to a familiar winter grey. The India Meteorological Department has forecast a transition from rainy spells to a week with foggy conditions and has issued a yellow alert for “one or two spells of light rain” in the city on Tuesday. Another fresh Western Disturbance is expected to affect Northwest India Friday.

Gurgaon constable who played key role in Bhim Jora encounter felicitated

CONSTABLE ROHIT Balaoria of Gurgaon Police’s Sector 43 Crime Branch was felicitated by Haryana Chief Minister Nayab Singh Saini on the occasion of Republic Day on Monday.

He received a commendation certificate for his contribution to the ‘encounter’ of notorious criminal Bhim Bahadur Jora in October last year.

Constable Balaoria said it was a morale booster for not just himself, but the entire force. Speaking about the operation, he said: “...I was in Nepal, undercover, for 10 days in September. I gathered intel on his (Jora’s) last movements. I also figured out how he functioned — he would change phones and addresses every week to

avoid detection. We managed to trace his last movements and lure him back to Delhi.”

Jora, a 30-year-old Nepalese national and a gang leader, was wanted in multiple cases and carried a reward of Rs 1 lakh. He had evaded arrest for 17 months after he allegedly got involved in the murder of a 63-year-old doctor during a burglary in Delhi’s Jangpura Extension in May 2024.

Jora headed a syndicate operating for over a decade across cities like Delhi, Gurgaon, Surat, Mumbai, and Bengaluru.

At the programme on Monday at the Tau Devi Lal Stadium, Sub-Inspectors Lalit Kumar, Chandrakanta and Arun, and Assistant Sub Inspectors Ravindra and Yashpal were also handed commendation certificates.

SEMINAR ON CASTE AND RACE

Explain choice of speakers, content: IIT-D to organisers

THE INDIAN Institute of Technology-Delhi (IIT-Delhi) has asked “concerned faculty” to explain the “choice of speakers and content” at a conference on caste and race organised by the institute’s Department of Humanities and Social Sciences earlier this month. The conference, titled ‘Critical Philosophy of Caste & Race (CPCR3): Celebrating 25 Years of Durban: Indian Contributions to Combatting Caste and Racism’, was held between January 16 and 18.

IIT-Delhi, on its official X handle on Monday, said: “Serious concerns have been raised over the choice of speakers and content of the conference. The Institute has sought an explanation from the concerned faculty, and a fact-finding committee with independent members has also been set up to investigate concerns raised about the conference. Appropriate

actions will be initiated in accordance with institutional protocols, based on the committee’s findings.”

The statement followed critical posts on X objecting to the allegedly “one-sided narrative on caste”, and alleged “woke nonsense” discussed at the conference by “radical activists”.

The three-day conference included keynote lectures and panel sessions by scholars and activists from Indian and foreign universities on the themes of caste-, race- and descent-based discrimination.

On the third day, in Session 5 chaired by Gajendran Ayyathurai of the University of Göttingen in Germany, one of the papers was by Aarushi Punia, an independent researcher, titled ‘What’s common between Dalits and Palestinians?’

Other speakers in the same session included Indian American Dalit rights activist Thenmozhi Soundararajan on ‘25 Years of Racial and Caste Equity Impact of Durban


on Dalit Americans’, Smita M Patil of the School of Gender and Development studies at IGNOU on ‘Intensifying the Culture: Rethinking Race and Caste’, and the Tamil writer P Sivakami on ‘The Intersectional Struggle: Decoding Caste and Gender in P Sivakami’s Narratives’.

Responding to a questionnaire over email, Divya Dwivedi, professor (Literature Philosophy) and co-organiser of the conference, wrote: “The conference is academic in its aim and scope, which is to generate critical thinking on social inequalities towards an egalitarian and sustainable world, and it builds on existing academic research and publications including mine which can be looked up. The conference is devoted to promoting the constitutional values of equality, liberty, dignity and fraternity through scholarly discussion of the past and present Indian contributions towards combatting social inequalities and social injustice...”

Woman kidnapped in Gurgaon, 1 held

Gurgaon: A 25-year-old man, accused of kidnapping a 23-year-old woman in the Leopard Trail area of the Aravalli ranges, was arrested in Gurgaon early on Sunday, police said.

According to the police, the woman was returning from an event when the accused allegedly approached her and claimed that his phone was stolen. They said he allegedly pulled her inside a Mahindra Scorpio car and drove to a forested area near Leopard Trail. A friend of the woman, who was with her at the event, meanwhile, alerted the police. Officers said that a team reached the location and arrested the accused. An FIR was registered at Badshahpur police station for kidnapping. Police also said that the woman sustained injuries and received treatment.

Pride and joy: Marchers & Rafales steal R-Day show

Tableaux, kids, special guests celebrate the Indian Republic

ASHISH SHAH'S jaw dropped when the Rafale aircraft whizzed over his head. "However old you might be, the parade and aircraft make you feel like a child, it makes me energetic," said the 63-year-old, a former college professor.

Shah was among thousands gathered along Kartavya Path on a crisp winter morning on Monday as India celebrated its 77th Republic Day by putting on a showcase of its military might that included elite marching contingents, missiles and indigenous weapon systems at the centre of the Capital.

This was Shah's first time attending the parade in the national capital. There were many like him.

The parade commenced with President Droupadi Murmu taking the salute. Prime Minister Narendra Modi, Defence Minister Rajnath Singh, several other Union ministers, the country's top military brass, foreign diplomats, and senior officials were among those present. Thirty tableaux — 17 of states and union territories and 13 of ministries, departments and services — rolled down the road to loud applause. The show-stopper, however, was the Indian Air Force (IAF) flypast.

In a magnificent display of the country's air power, the IAF's fighter jets flew in a special Sindoore formation. The seven-aircraft formation comprised two Rafales, two Su-30s, two

MiG-29s and a Jaguar aircraft. Among the spectators was Mona Kumari (35). Dressed in a sari that sported the colours of the Indian flag, she had hoped to watch the parade with her family. "Somehow, only my ticket came through, no one else's," she said.

Unfazed, she came alone. "My husband dropped me at the gate and I watched the parade alone. I was just amazed by the discipline of the soldiers who were marching. They must have practiced for so many days, I can't even imagine. It looks so much better than watching it on TV," she said, a smile on her face she couldn't contain.

For Raveena Tanwar (30), the helicopters and fighter jets left her in awe. "I wanted to make sure my children actually know what they read about in the textbooks, so we asked a relative to arrange some tickets for us," she said. Around 10,000 special guests from across the country — farmers, artisans, scientists, innovators, women entrepreneurs, students, sportspersons, beneficiaries of flagship government schemes, and frontline workers — were invited to the programme.

Also invited were school children who had taken part in various competitions held across India to commemorate the 150th anniversary of Vande Mataram. One of them was Roshan Arjun (16); he had come to Delhi all the way from the town of Cheyyar in Tamil Nadu with his father. He was invited as he was among the top 200 short-listed from across the country in a quiz held on ISRO's work.

"I was inspired by the celebrations and I'm now more keen to read about the Constitution and follow its ideals," Arjun, who wants to become an astronaut, said.

2,500 dance to the spirit of Vande Mataram

AS AROUND 2,500 artists from different parts of India — donning traditional costumes representing different states — came together on Monday during the 77th Republic Day parade at Kartavya Path in Delhi to perform on 'Vande Mataram', which is also this year's theme, their presentation embodied the spirit of India's unity in diversity. Different groups presented different classical and folk dance forms on the national song during the performance.

The annual parade and the days they spent in Delhi in the run up to the Republic Day celebrations gave them memories they would cherish for a long time. Performing in front of Prime Minister Narendra Modi, foreign dignitaries and many other key personalities was a dream come true for many.

Around 10 students of Maharaja Sayajirao University in Gujarat's Vadodara practiced for 25 days prior to the event. While all of them are undergraduate students in performing arts, learning Bharatanatyam, a classical dance form

most of them have been practicing for at least a couple of years, they said they were a little anxious for this performance and wanted to put in extra efforts.

"We practised for a long time even though it was a small performance," said Divya Patel, Assistant Professor in the Performing Arts department at the university.

Many student performers were delighted to catch glimpses of sorties by fighter jets during rehearsals. "While we couldn't see the parade today, we have been in awe of these formations by the jets

during the practice sessions," a student said.

Disha Handique, 20, who along with her group of six performed Sattriya, a classical dance form from Assam, said, "The other performances were so beautiful that I can't even express it in words." The group comprises students of the Srimanta Sankaradeva University in Guwahati and have been practicing for 12 days now.

However, Handique added, "I really enjoyed the entire experience of performing in front of so many dignitaries, but the air in Delhi is very bad. Ever since we landed here, the air

smells different and makes us feel a little nauseous."

Meanwhile, for artists from Chhattisgarh, presenting their folk dance, 'Gedi' or bamboo dance, has been a reassurance that the art is still alive and thriving. In the group of 35 dancers from Bilaspur, which also had fresh entrants, few have been practicing since decades. They began their practice sessions on January 6. The sessions used to start at 7:30 am. "The last three days were the most exciting when we rehearsed at the Kartavya Path. This is the best experience of my life... My parents are very

proud of me," said Priyanshu Bhaskar (20). Another group member said, "This is a very great platform to showcase our folk dance... This costume is also fully handmade and takes around 12 days to make. This gives us visibility."

There was a group from Manipur too.

For Elina, 24, a group member, the most treasured memory she is taking home is the group's visit to Sarojini Nagar the hub of flea shopping. "We used to get a window of a few hours from 11 am till 3 pm... we used to rush there. We have brought lots of clothes."

'I got goosebumps...': R-Day parade fuels dream of NCC cadets to join armed forces

IT'S 5 am on Monday. A group of young National Cadet Corps (NCC) cadets — dressed in crisp uniforms — reach the Kartavya Path, the venue for the Republic Day parade. All of them are in high spirits and clear about what they need to do.

They divide themselves in two groups — one to help traffic marshals and the other to specially-abled visitors.

Once the parade has started, and they can take a break from their duties, they go and take the seats as audience.

Many of them feel closer to their dream of clearing the Central Defence Services Exam.

Inspired, Vipin Kumar (21), who joined the NCC in 2023, says, "My exam is approaching in April. This is not just any

other day. It reminds us how the country should function — about our rights and equality."

Aryan (19), another NCC cadet, is drawing his future

roadmap in his head. "I was excited to see the parade today as my father is a retired Army officer. Seeing the forces come together makes me believe in di-

versity all the more, which we usually see in the NCC too. Bhairav contingent is the highlight. I will aim to join this contingent in future," he says.

Sitting next to him, cadet Sayon Mandal (21) chimes in, "You know, in the morning, when we came here, it was all so silent but as soon as the salute took place, I got goosebumps. One of the reasons I joined NCC was to one day come and witness the parade."

Priyanshu (20), who has been a part of NCC for two years now, says a lot has changed since he witnessed the parade five years back for the first time. "The technology plays a much bigger role. Drones play a crucial role now, that is a big difference."

His father works for the Delhi Police but he aims to make it to the armed forces.

CM nod to Rs 327 crore for slum development projects

CM REKHA Gupta on Monday celebrated her first Republic Day after taking charge at her official residence on Monday by approving projects worth Rs 327 crore for the development of slum clusters across Delhi. Officials said works amounting to Rs 44 crore have been awarded. The CM hosted BJP representatives from slums and jhuggi jhopri (JJ) clusters to her residence for a lunch and inaugurated basic infrastructure projects for the clusters.

The projects approved include public convenience complexes and cement concrete (CC) works in the lanes of JJ clusters, said officials, besides Atal Canteens and Ayushman Arogya Mandirs.

"The CM also shared lunch with the JJ cluster represen-

tatives and said that the Delhi government is working with full commitment to improving the living standards of citizens residing in JJ clusters," a statement from her office read.

The programme was also attended by Urban Development Minister Ashish Sood, and Delhi BJP chief Virendra Sachdeva among others.

20-YEAR-OLD DISAPPEARED IN KONDLI NALA ON SATURDAY

Two days after man immersing idol was swept away, kin await news from divers

EVER SINCE 20-year-old Vikas drowned in the Yamuna on Saturday, his brother, Rahul (32) has been frequenting the river bank near his home in Noida's Harola, desperately waiting for an update.

Vikas, who was pursuing graduation, and three of his friends, said police, visited the Kondli Nala in East Delhi, about 3 km from his home, on Saturday to immerse the idol after the celebrations for Saraswati Puja concluded.

"Four of them went in and only three returned. It took us some time to realise that Vikas

never came out," recalled Rahul.

Search operations entered the second day on Monday as teams of the Uttar Pradesh State Disaster Response Force (SDRF), along with the National Disaster Response Force (NDRF), and divers from the Delhi Boating Club continued to comb through the black waters.

By evening, several relatives of Vikas had started losing patience. "Use a net... do anything! How long will you make us wait?" asked one of the relatives as the divers continued to work.

Raghubir Singh, leading a team of divers, remained un-

moved. "I'm doing my best here, please understand. The river is too full of trash to use a net. We're working with limited

resources," he said. The relatives, exasperated, continued to argue until Singh turned his boat around and left.

Rahul tried hard to hold himself together. "I don't blame them (the divers) for not being able to hold their breath under

the filthy water. Locals have told me that there is a deep pit under the water, on the other side of the Nala. If the water was clean, the divers would have been able to spot him," he said.

The NDRF has deployed three boats to comb through the waters with long iron rakes. The SDRF has deployed one boat, while the Delhi Boating Club divers have four boats of their own.

According to the divers' in-charge, Harish Kumar, the distance between the Nala and the mouth of the Yamuna is not more than 1 km.

However, several issues slowed down the search operation. "The call first went to the

UP Police since Kondli falls between the Delhi and Noida border," explained Raghubir Singh, leading the team of five divers present on scene.

"The NDRF and SDRF did reach the place on time, but they used boats to look for the body. Boats move a lot of water when they move, it would have moved the body further downstream," he said.

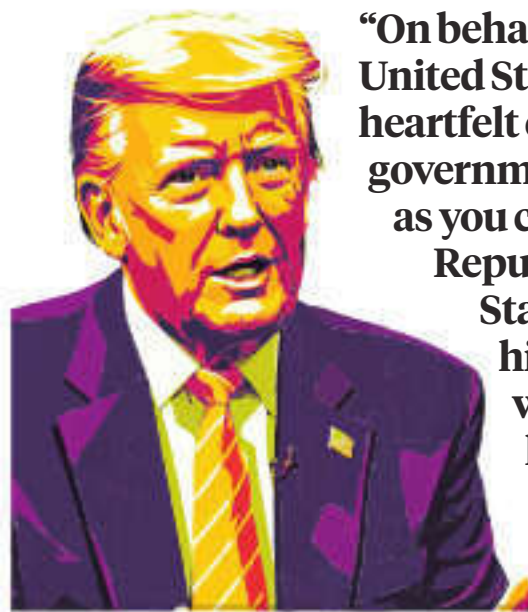
Singh further alleged that while the first call went to the NDRF at 8 pm on Saturday, the divers were only notified by 9:30 pm.

"In that one-and-a-half hours, the boats had circled the area several times. In cases like these, it's difficult to estimate

where the body has moved," he said. The divers continued operations late into the night and had to pause around midnight due to poor visibility. The operations resumed at 6 am the following day.

The divers from the Delhi Boating Club too have faced a slew of challenges during the operation. "The water is extremely cold, the current is fast and the water levels are high," explained one of them, adding, "Since the water is cold, the temperature will not let the body come to the river bed, if he has died. At this point, we believe that the body can only be retrieved once it bloats and rises to the surface."

Military might, with a dash of Sindoor

BrahMos, Akash, battle tank Arjun — weapon systems fire up parade

IN ITS first Republic Day celebrations after Operation Sindoor, India showcased its military might with a display of fighter jets, indigenously built missiles, newly raised units and lethal weapons used during the military operations last year.

President of the European Council Antonio Costa and President of the European Commission Ursula von der Leyen were the chief guests at the 77th Republic Day celebrations, the theme for which was '150 years of Vande Mataram'.

The parade began with President Droupadi Murmu taking the salute shortly after she arrived at Kartavya Path in a traditional buggy along with Costa and von der Leyen.

PM Narendra Modi, Defence Minister Rajnath Singh, several other Union ministers, the country's top military brass, foreign diplomats and senior officials were among the spectators. Around 10,000 special guests were invited.

BrahMos supersonic missiles, Akash weapon systems, 'Suryastra' universal rocket launcher system, Main Battle Tank Arjun, Dhanush artillery guns and Divyastra battery were among the major weapon systems displayed at the parade.

A total of 29 Indian Air Force aircraft, including 16 fighter jets, four transport aircraft and nine helicopters, participated in the flypast. Notably, two Rafale jets, two MiG-29s, two Su-30s, and one Jaguar aircraft flew in a special Op Sindoor formation, alongside other formations, including transport aircraft and helicopters of the IAF. On the ground, the IAF contingent comprised four officers and 144 airmen.

For the first time, the parade showcased a phased Battle Array Format of the Indian Army, including the aerial component. It showcased the Recce element comprising the 61 Cavalry, followed by High Mobility Reconnaissance Vehicle, India's first indigenously designed Armoured Light Specialist Vehicle. This was followed by the T-90 BHISHMA and Main Battle Tank Arjun rolling past the saluting dais with aerial support from combat helicopters.

Other Mechanised Columns included BMP-II Infantry Combat Vehicle, along with Nag Missile System (Tracked) Mk-2. A detachment of Special Forces also followed, comprising Ajayketu All-Terrain Vehicle, Randhwa

Rugged Terrain Tactical Transport System and Dhawansak Light Strike Vehicles. Following them were Robotic Dogs, UGVs and four Autonomous Unmanned Ground Vehicles.

The combat support element comprised India's new generation unmanned warhead arsenal showcased through Shaktibaana and Divyastra, mounted on specialised High Mobility Vehicles (HMV 6x6).

They demonstrated advanced surveillance through swarm drones, tethered drone systems, and an indigenously developed tactical hybrid UAV ZOLT, employed for direction of artillery fire. A range of loitering munitions were also showcased.

A glass-cased Integrated Operational Centre, depicting the conduct of Operation Sindoor in brief, also rolled down Kartavya Path.

An animal contingent featuring soldiers alongside Bactrian camels, Zanskar ponies, black kites (raptors), ingenious and vigilant birds and Indian breed dogs (Mudhol Hound, Rampur Hound, Chippiparai, Kombai, and Rajapalayam) equipped with bullet-resistant jackets, cameras, GPS, radios and advanced surveillance systems, were also showcased.

A military contingent from the EU, carrying the military staff flag and flags of Operations Atalanta and Aspidex, the naval operations of the grouping, also featured at the parade. It was the EU's first participation in such an event outside of Europe.

The Indian Navy tableau depicted a stitched ship from the fifth century CE, now christened INSV Kaundinya.

Stalin talks diversity, Himanta says choose between vote bank politics & progress

FROM JAMMU and Kashmir to Kerala and Tamil Nadu, states celebrated the 77th Republic Day across the country on Monday. While J&K L-G Manoj Sinha said that "a new dawn" has arrived in the UT, Manipur Governor Ajay Kumar Bhalla called for strengthening peace and upholding ideals of the Constitution.

Chief Ministers also shared their messages on the occasion. Uttar Pradesh CM Yogi Adityanath said the citizens of India are the real guardians of the Constitution, while Tamil Nadu CM M K Stalin took a

veiled dig at the BJP government at the Centre, saying, "Let's celebrate a unified India. Not a uniform India."

Speaking at the M A Stadium in Jammu, L-G Manoj Sinha said that "decades of suppressed pain and tears are finally receiving dignity and justice", assuring people that "every case linked to terrorism will be thoroughly examined, fresh investigations will be conducted, and the guilty will face the strictest punishment".

He described Operation Sindoor as a "defining moment in India's national security doctrine" that "any terrorist attack on its soil would be treated as an act of war".

"Operation Sindoor was not merely a military action; it was a declaration of India's strategic resolve," he said, adding that "we struck at the heart of the enemy, dismantled their terror infrastructure, exposed the hollowness of nuclear threats, and reaffirmed our unwavering commitment to protecting national sovereignty".

Bhalla said, "... let us resolve to uphold the ideals of our constitution, strengthen peace and harmony, and work with dedication towards inclusive development and social justice." The state has been under the President's Rule since February last year.

Karnataka Governor Thaa-

warchand Gehlot said disbursements under the five guarantee schemes, which have brought significant changes in the lives of women apart from increasing the purchasing power of

families, have exceeded Rs 1.13 lakh crore.

Emphasising on "many-ness", CM Stalin said, "We must remain a country where cultures enrich one another, languages

coexist with pride and faith is a personal truth. Our strength has never been sameness. It has always been our many-ness. When diversity is protected, belonging feels natural."

Taking a veiled dig at the Centre, Stalin in his message said, "Let's celebrate a unified India. Not a uniform India."

Kerala CM Pinarayi Vijayan in a Facebook post called for vigilance against forces attempting to weaken the vision of "unity in diversity" and impose a monolithic ideology.

"The federal concept of a strong Centre with empowered states is facing serious challenges. We should stand together against policies that aim to

weaken federalism by curtailing the financial powers of states and turning constitutional institutions into political tools," he said.

CM Adityanath said, "The real guardian of the Constitution is India's citizens."

"Whenever the basic spirit of the Constitution is disrespected, it is not just an insult to the Constitution but also to those great personalities whose sacrifices ensured the country's freedom," Adityanath said.

Assam CM Himanta Biswa Sarma said the time has come for people to think and make a choice whether they want "vote bank politics" or take forward the development journey launched by his government

during the last five years.

He said that people must decide whether they want to "surrender to Bangladeshi Muslims" or be part of progress and development. "We have decided not to surrender to the Bangladeshi Muslims who have encroached upon huge areas of land and threatened our identity, culture and traditions. We have started the process of reclaiming our land by evicting the encroachers," he said.

Sarma said his government was committed to protect people's 'maati' (land), 'bheti' (foundation), 'sanskriti' (culture) and 'parichay' (identity) to protect and secure the rights of the future generation.

“On behalf of the people of the United States, I extend my heartfelt congratulations to the government and people of India as you celebrate your 77th Republic Day,” the US President said. “The United States and India share a historic bond as the world’s oldest and largest democracies,” he said in a message put out on social media by the US Embassy in New Delhi.

According to a report in Axios, a US media outlet, Cruz told donors in private meetings about “battling” the White House to accept a trade agreement with India. Axios cited audio recordings of conversations - reportedly provided by a Republican source.

When a donor asked who in the administration was resisting the deal, Cruz mentioned White House economic adviser Peter Navarro, Vance and “sometimes” Trump, the report

said citing a nearly 10-minute-long recording from early and mid-2025.

The Texas Republican senator, who is eyeing a 2028 White House run, also warned that Trump’s tariffs could decimate the economy and lead to his impeachment. Cruz said that after Trump introduced the tariffs in early April 2025, he and a few

other senators had a call with the President in which they urged him to stand down.

He said the lengthy call, which stretched past midnight, “did not go well,” and that Trump was “yelling” and “cursing.” Ties between India and US have strained over the past few months since the Trump-led administration imposed 50 per cent tariffs, including 25 per cent for buying Russian oil.

Trump has also been claiming credit for brokering the ceasefire between India and Pakistan in May last year, during Operation Sindoor, a claim denied by India. Earlier this month, US Commerce Secretary Howard Lutnick claimed that the trade deal with India did not happen because Prime Minister Narendra Modi did not call President Trump.

However, since US Ambassador to India Sergio Goro has come to India earlier this month, efforts are underway to bring the ties back on track. Trade negoti-

ators have had a call, and India has been invited to join Pax Silica — a strategic initiative by the US on critical minerals. Also, a three-member bipartisan US Congressional delegation met External Affairs minister S Jaishankar over the weekend.

On Monday, US Secretary of State Marco Rubio also extended greetings to India on the occasion of Republic Day and said the two nations share a “historic bond.” “From our close cooperation on defense, energy, critical minerals, and emerging technologies to our multi-layered engagement through the Quad, the US-India relationship delivers real results for our two countries and for the Indo-Pacific region,” he said.

“I look forward to working together to advance our shared objectives in the year ahead,” Rubio said in a statement.

Ambassador Sergio Goro also greeted India after attending the Republic Day celebrations.

Bareilly city magistrate threatens to quit, cites new UGC regulations, Shankaracharya row

PROTESTING AGAINST the new University Grants Commission (UGC) regulations, as well as the alleged mishandling of Swami Avimukteshwaranand Saraswati, Provincial Civil Service (PCS) officer Alan- kar Agnihotri said on Monday that he was resigning. A 2019-batch officer, Agnihotri is currently posted as Bareilly City Magistrate.

The snap decision created ripples, sources said, with meetings continuing late into Monday evening to control the situation.

The new rules notified by the UGC on January 13 — the Promotion of Equity in Higher Education Institutions Regulations, 2026 — have been criticised by general category students, ar-

guing that the framework could lead to discrimination against them. The rules mandate all higher education institutions to form ‘equity committees’ to look into discrimination complaints. These committees need to include members of OBCs, SCs, STs, persons with disabilities, and women.

There were reports Monday evening of some BJP office-bearers in Noida and Lucknow too resigning in protest over these rules, though there was no confirmation of same.

Posting a photo on social media of him standing outside his residence with a poster that read “#UGC rollback, kala kaanoon wapas lo (take back the black law)”, Agnihotri alleged that the UGC rules would lead to “harassment” of general category students.

It also read “Shankara-

charya aur sanaton ka yeh apman nahi sahega Hindustan

(India will not tolerate this insult to Shankaracharya and the Sanatan [Hindu] tradition).” It ended with the words ‘boycott BJP’, ‘boycott Brahmin MP MLA’. The controversy over Saraswati, the “Shankaracharya” or chief of the Jyotirmath in Uttarakhand, was over the UP Police allegedly preventing him from taking a holy dip at the Triveni Sangam on the occasion of Mauni Amavasya on January 18 — the incident has since turned into a political battlefield.

Later in the day, Agnihotri told media persons about the reasons for his resignation. “I have made both reasons clear. First, Shankaracharya ji and his disciples were subjected to disrespect... and the government failed to take notice. Second, the UGC regulations... declare gen-

eral category students solely accountable,” he claimed.

He went on to allege that “an anti-Brahmin campaign is going on in the Uttar Pradesh government”. Sources said while Agnihotri continued to issue statements against the government on social media, attempts were made to enter into a dialogue with him.

Speaking to The Indian Express, Bareilly Commissioner Bhupendra Chaudhary said, “The matter has come to our notice and we are examining it. Soon, a decision will be taken on (it).” A senior officer in the state government said till late evening, no official resignation from Agnihotri was received by the Appointments Department.

Stating that there is a protocol to be followed for any PCS officer to tender their resignation, the senior officer said: “After in-

forming their higher-ups, they should hand over the resignation [letter] to the Appointments Department, which is then accepted by the Governor. In this case, it is a mere letter that has been made public but has not yet been received by the Appointments Department.”

Sources in the government also said disciplinary action against Agnihotri was being considered as till his resignation is not officially received and accepted, he would continue to be in government service and Service Rules would apply to him.

Agnihotri hails from Kanpur. He has a BTech degree from IIT-BHU along with a degree in Law. He served as Additional Municipal Commissioner, Lucknow, from 2003 to 2005. He has also served as Deputy Collector in Etah, Balrampur and Unnao.

Houses set on fire in Manipur village, militants claim responsibility

SUSPECTED MEMBERS of a Naga militant group set a few houses belonging to the Kuki-Zo community on fire in Manipur’s Kangpokpi district on Monday. The incident occurred at K Songlung-II village under Kangchup police station, police confirmed. While three houses and an SUV were set on fire, there have been no reports of any injuries, police said.

A team of police led by DIGS P Kangpokpi have rushed to the area. While a faction of the Zeliangrong United Front (ZUF), an armed militant group, have claimed responsibility for the incident, a Kuki-Zo group has demanded action in the matter within 24 hours, threatening to shut down the highways.

Several videos of the incident, purportedly showing burning houses in a hilly area, have surfaced on social media platforms.

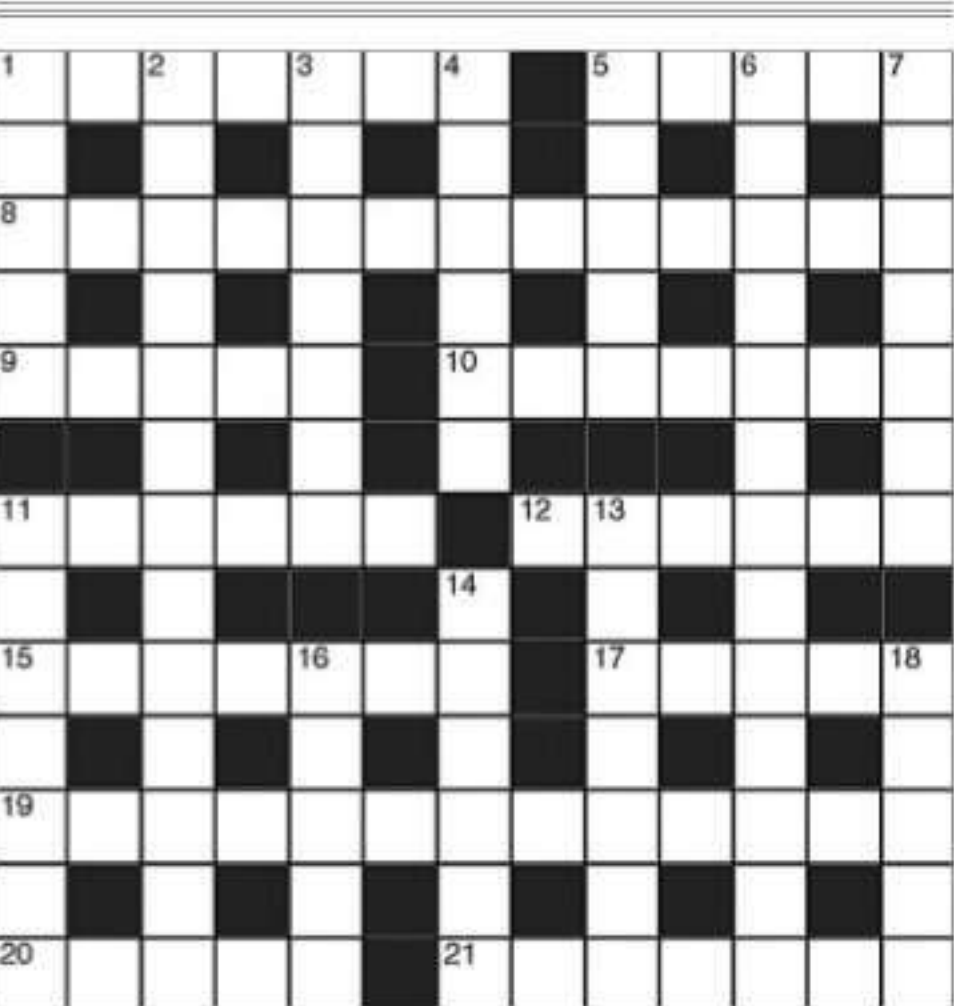
In an unsigned statement, ZUF, allegedly led by Kamson, who goes by only one name, said, “ZUF has intensified its decisive campaign against illegal poppy cultivation, narcotics trafficking, and unlawful encroachment by illegal immigrants within the ancestral, customary, and historical territory of the Zeliangrong Inpui Naga people.”

The statement further read, “Despite repeated public alerts and time granted for peaceful compliance, enforcement action was carried out at 12.15 pm... burnt the farm houses, farms and dismantled other essential materials against illegal poppy cultivation and unauthorised structures in the Waphong area of the Songnung Sadar Hills, Kangpokpi District, Manipur.”

Many Kuki-Zo civil bodies, including the Indigenous Tribal Leader’s Forum (ITLF), Sadar Hills Chief Association (SAHILCA), Committee on Tribal Unity (COTU), among others, condemned the outfit.

COTU, a Kuki-Zo group in Kangpokpi, issued an ultimatum to the government, demanding the arrest of those behind the incident in 24 hours.

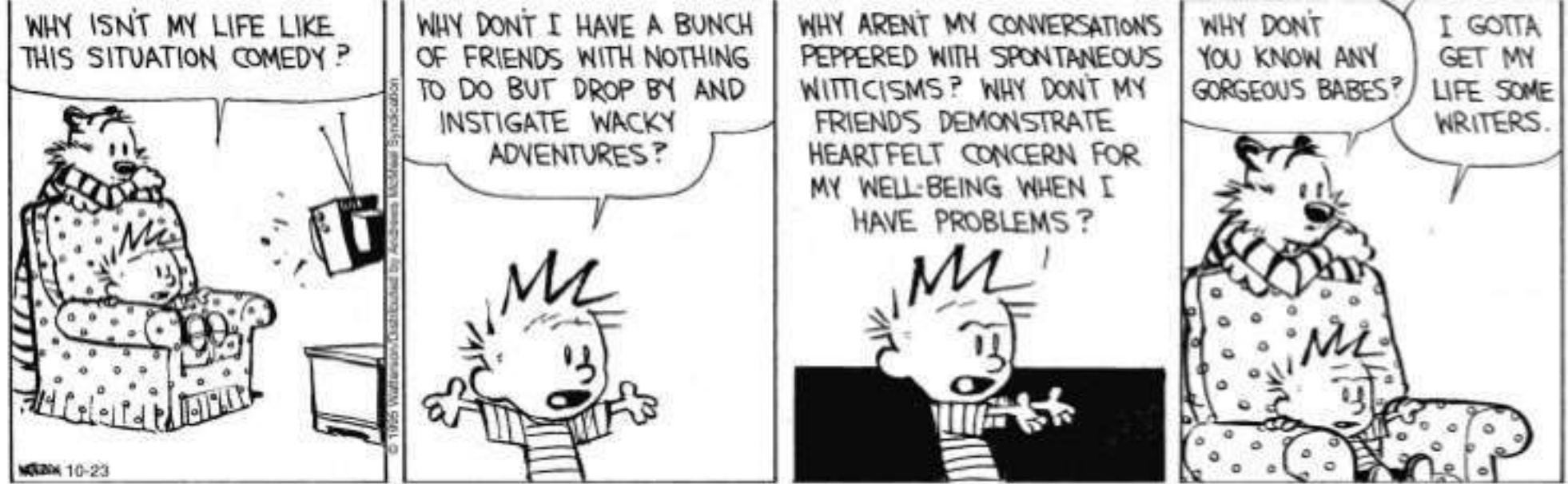

UP: 16-year-old girl strangled to death, four held

TO TEACH a 16-year-old girl "a lesson for playing them", two men allegedly strangled her and placed her body on a railway track, where it was run over by a passing train, said the Lucknow Police.

The two accused, along with two of their aides, were arrested on Republic Day, said police. According to police, the duo — Anshu Gautam alias Lucky (20) and Ashiq Yadav (20) — are friends. Police said the accused killed the girl, suspecting she was allegedly in a relationship with both of them. Suresh Singh, in-charge of the police station concerned, said Anshu, Ashiq and the other accused — Rinshu Yadav and Vaibhav Singh Rajput — work in a private factory.

Badrinath-Kedarnath may ban non-Hindus from entering temples

Shrine panel chief says decision in upcoming meeting, even as official claims all stakeholders not consulted

THE TEMPLE committees of Char Dham shrines may pass resolutions banning the entry of "non-Hindus" into the temple premises, with the Badrinath-Kedarnath Temple Committee president, Hemant Dwivedi, saying a decision will be passed at the upcoming board meeting.

However, a senior office-bearer of the Board said that no discussion has taken place on this. The next meeting, to chart the budget, is scheduled for February.

Dwivedi said that the entry of all non-Hindus will be banned. "We will convene our board meeting and pass this resolution. We will also discuss the matter with the administration and the Chief Minister. There are similar demands regarding the entry of non-Hindus on the ghats in Haridwar," Dwivedi told reporters.

However, the office-bearer, who did not wish to be named, said that the matter has not come up so far, and the statement was made without consultation with the Board or stakeholders. "This is a matter we need to discuss with stakeholders, including the traders and labourers. Most of these groups are non-Hindus; how can we ask them to leave? Currently, only those who adhere to the practices of the religion enter the temple. Besides, those who accompany government officers and dignitaries are also non-Hindus," said the member.

He added that Sikhs, Jains, and Buddhists will not be excluded. "He should have said that non-Sanatanis are to be excluded," he added.

The Temple Committee is an undertaking of the government with 17 members, established under the 1948 Act of Uttar Pradesh. The administration of both Kedarnath and Badrinath temples is governed by

the committee, which includes public representatives, a chairman, members, and government officials. The chairman and vice chairman are nominated by the state government.

Meanwhile, the chairman of the Shri Gangotri Dham Temple Committee, Dharmanand Semwal, said the board will deliberate on a similar proposal. "We also demand that those who hurt our religion should not be given entry. The CM has also said that it will be discussed because this is a general sentiment that residents have raised," he said. Asked about the entry of people, including the Governor, Gurmeet Singh, who belongs to the Sikh religion, he said, "Sikhs

have come from Hinduism and worship our lords... No resolution has been passed in the committee yet. If passed, it will be forwarded to the administration, and if they approve, it will be implemented," Semwal said, adding that this is a nascent demand currently. "We will discuss who is a non-Hindu," he said.

The four Dhams are visited by many people, including international tourists from across the world, who come for trekking. The four pilgrimage sites recorded footfall of 51 lakh in 2025, of which Badrinath Dham reported 16.6 lakh visitors. Kedarnath remained the temple with the highest footfall with

17.68 lakh pilgrims.

Former chief minister and Congress leader Harish Rawat said that the BJP is resorting to communal polarisation. "It has nothing to do with Hindu pilgrimage. In Har Ki Pauri, municipal bylaws have restricted the entry of non-Hindus, and people have been following this since then. There is a general sentiment that those from other religions keep away from these places. Those who would earlier gatekeep their religious places have started opening them to all, while Hinduism, which is known for being open to all, is closing its doors," he said.

Rawat asked, "If the head of the state is a non-Hindu, will you decide that those areas will be out of bounds and out of their jurisdiction?"

Meanwhile, senior Congress leader Suryakant Dhasmana said that this is an agenda to divert people's attention from real issues. "They have propped up hoardings at Har Ki Pauri in Haridwar. International tourists visit these places. How will you bar these people? Anyone can enter any public space under the Constitution. These are gimmicks for distracting people," he said.

FIR UNDER UP'S ANTI-CONVERSION LAW FILED AGAINST FIVE MUSLIM GIRLS

After Moradabad burqa row, one girl sent out of town, another stops tuitions, third skips school

TILL A month-old CCTV footage surfaced last week, appearing to show six giggling girls putting a burqa on one of them, they were known to be a tight group. Neighbours and students of Class 12 in a school in Moradabad, they would together walk to and from a tuition centre where they were preparing for NEET.

Now, after the filing of an FIR under the Uttar Pradesh Prohibition of Unlawful Conversion of Religion Act against the five Muslim girls in the group, at least one has been sent away to her grandparents' place, while another has stopped going for tuitions. The families of the accused are hoping the matter will get resolved. It was "a case of misunderstanding", they say.

The uncle of one of the accused girls says: "All the families met along with some local leaders on Sunday. Everyone agrees this was a mistake of judgment that the girls made in their childishness."

The stringent UP Act was invoked after the family of the sole Hindu girl in the group alleged she was pressured by the others to wear a burqa while they were returning from tuition classes. Barring one girl who is 20, the rest are between the ages of 16 and 18 and minors.

Police said the matter is

under investigation and that no arrests have been made so far. In case of "forcible conversion" of minors, women or SC/STs, the UP Act can involve punishment between three and 10 years, and a fine of at least Rs 25,000.

The tuition classes the six attended are held by a teacher from their school in Sahu Kunj, an area with predominantly Hindu households. It was a short walk from the neighbouring villages where the six live, both of which have a mixed population.

Inspector Ashok Kumar, the investigating officer in the case, said: "The CCTV footage is from December 20, 2025...we are in-

vestigating why the girls had an extra burqa. The FIR was registered on January 22 after the video began circulating."

In the footage, all the girls are laughing as the Hindu girl is handed a burqa. One of the girls is heard saying she will look good wearing it.

The complaint was filed by the Hindu girl's brother, who runs a mobile phone shop.

Rajeev Chaudhary, whose CCTV camera captured the incident, said, "Some women sitting outside mentioned that a Hindu girl was being made to wear a burqa. I then checked my CCTV footage and shared it with police.

I don't know how the video went viral," he told *The Indian Express*. Inspector Kumar said that they had recorded the statement of the Hindu girl, and were yet to question the five friends named in the FIR.

In her statement, the Hindu girl claimed she was friends with only one of the five girls, the one carrying the burqa. While she has alleged that the group encouraged her to wear the burqa, the uncle of one of the accused girls said the five had carried the burqa only to help their Hindu friend avoid being seen by her family as they were planning to go to a local eatery for snacks.

"My niece has told us that the Hindu girl's brother forbade her from going anywhere else after tuitions. Since his shop is located on her way home, she was worried about being seen. The girls thought covering her with a burqa would help her avoid trouble at home," the uncle said. He added that since the case was registered, his niece has stopped attending school and has been sent to her maternal grandmother's home.

The family members of another accused girl also said the incident had been misunderstood and that there was no intention to pressure anyone or interfere with religious beliefs. A former village pradhan, the father of the girl said his daughter was being unfairly im-

plicated simply because she appeared in the CCTV footage. "She was only present there. She did not force anyone to do anything," he said. "We respect all religions. Women in our family wear saris too on some occasions, and burqa is just a form of clothing for us. There was no religious agenda..." He said he will send his daughter to school only for the board exams now.

Additional Superintendent of Police, Moradabad, Kunwar Akash Singh said the police are examining all the versions carefully. "Preliminary inquiry indicates that the girls knew each other and studied together... We are investigating the allegations in detail. No arrests have been made so far."

Since the case was filed, other allegations have been made, including that the Hindu girl was being "encouraged" to eat non-vegetarian food. "...they said gravy gravy *kha lo, usmein kya hota hai* (They said just eat the gravy, what's in it)," she has told police. She has also said the friends would talk positively about Islam.

"We were always against their friendship," says the girl's brother, adding, "she has stopped going to tuitions."

The tuition teacher distanced himself from the entire matter. He didn't know anything about the six, he told *The Indian Express*.

Tourists stranded in Manali as roads blocked; more snowfall likely today

HUNDREDS OF tourists are stranded in Manali after heavy snowfall in the region led to blockage of local link roads in the popular tourist destination and surrounding areas, leading to long lines of vehicles on adjoining routes, officials said on Monday. The Met office has forecast heavy snowfall in the higher hills of Himachal Pradesh on Tuesday, issuing an orange alert for Kullu, Kinnaur, Chamba, and Lahaul and Spiti districts. Police have advised people to avoid unnecessary travel until weather conditions improve and to refrain from visiting high-altitude areas. According to officials, tourists who had reached Manali prior to the snowfall are restricted to their accommodations as the thoroughfares are closed. PTI

Kingpin in codeine cough syrup case held

KANPUR POLICE has arrested a drug kingpin for his alleged role in running an inter-state network involved in the illegal trade of codeine-based cough syrup and narcotic drugs, officials said. Vinod Agrawal was arrested on Sunday from Narnaul, Haryana, said DCP (Crime) Shrawan Kumar Singh. The accused was involved in illegal procurement, storage and sale of narcotic drugs, and interstate trafficking, he said. PTI

2 boys run over by train while chasing kite

TWO BOYS, 10 and 13 years of age, chasing a kite on a railway track on Chandigarh's outskirts, were run over by a train, officials said on Monday. A group of boys were chasing a kite, which had got detached from its string, and failed to notice the approaching train, the GRP official said. The incident took place on Sunday evening near Harmilap Nagar colony in Baltana area of Chandigarh. PTI

11 security personnel injured in six IED blasts in Chhattisgarh

ELEVEN JAWANS were injured in six IED blasts during anti-Maoist operations in Chhattisgarh's Bijapur on the eve of Republic Day. All the jawans were airlifted to Raipur for treatment.

Acting on information about the presence of a formation of Maoists in the west of Usur in Bijapur district, a joint operation was undertaken on Saturday by the District Reserve Guard (DRG) and the Central Reserve Police Force's (CRPF) elite Commando Battalion for Resolute Action (CoBRA).

The operation took place near the Karegutta hills, which fall on the Chhattisgarh-Telangana border. The most deadly battalion of the Maoists' People's Liberation Guerrilla Army (PLGA), Battalion 1, is said to be holed up in the hills. Though it is

not clear if Battalion 1 was involved in the blasts, it has been learnt that Battalion 1 still has over 100 armed fighters.

Of the 11 injured jawans, 10 are from the DRG, and one is a sub-inspector with CoBRA. While three jawans suffered serious leg injuries, three others had splinter injuries in their eyes due to the blasts. "It was difficult to evacuate them from the spot due to the tough terrain, but all of them have been rescued and airlifted in a chopper to Raipur for better treatment. All of them are out of danger. They are stable, oriented and conscious," said a police officer.

This year, forces have gunned down 20 Maoists in Chhattisgarh. In 2024 and 2025, over 500 Maoists were gunned down by forces, with a majority of them in the Bijapur district. In the same period, 42 security personnel and 117 civilians were killed in Maoist violence.

FROM VELLAPPALLY NATESAN TO JAMAAT-E-ISLAMI HIND AND CHRISTIAN GROUP CAASA, SEVERAL OUTFITS TRYING TO SHAPE STATE'S POLITICAL DISCOURSE

Kerala powerbrokers: Caste, religious outfits that parties can't ignore in poll season

A WEEKLY LOOK AT POLITICS IN A STATE FROM NEW DELHI

IN THE bipolar landscape of Kerala politics that the BJP is seeking to break, a rather important and yet overlooked role is that of major community organisations representing different caste and religious interests.

With just months to go for the Assembly elections, outfits such as the Nair Service Society (NSS) and Sree Narayana Dharma Paripalana (SNDP) Yogam, the Samastha Kerala Jem-iyathul Ulama (AP faction) and Jamaat-e-Islami Hind, and the Christian Association and Alliance for Social Action (CAASA) are trying to play a role in state politics as caste and religious questions dominate the discourse.

While these outfits have their spheres of influence, the

degree to which they determine the voting choices of their members remains uncertain.

Left and Hindu votes

The NSS and the SNDP are among Kerala's most influential caste groups, and their support for the CPI(M)-led LDF has created a stir as it came at a time when two CPI(M) leaders made comments viewed as attempts to polarise the situation.

First, earlier this month, former state minister A K Balan alleged that if the Congress-led UDF returned to power, the Home Department would effectively be controlled by the Jamaat and communal violence like the one that occurred in Marad in Kozhikode in 2002 could happen again. Even as Balan faced backlash from the Congress and the Jamaat, CM Pinarayi Vijayan came out in his party colleague's defence.

Then, state minister Saji Cherian triggered a firestorm by

linking the local body poll results in Kasargode and Malappuram — two Muslim-dominated areas — to communal polarisation. The statement drew criticism from within the party and its support base, forcing Cherian to retract his comments.

In recent months, there has been a quiet shift by SNDP leader Vellappally Natesan towards the CPI(M). Natesan, who is from the backward Ezhava community, told the Varthamanam podcast of *ieMalayalam* that Vijayan would return to power for an unprecedented third term. This growing proximity between the CM and a leader known for making anti-Muslim remarks has also caused discomfort between the CPI(M) and the CPI.

Natesan's son Thushar Vellappally continues to head the SNDP's political arm Bharath Dharma Jana Sena, which is part of the BJP-led NDA. On Sunday, in a significant decision, the BJP-

led Centre announced the Padma Bhushan for Natesan. On Monday, NSS general secretary Sukumaran Nair said unity between the NSS and the SNDP was not possible in a "new political scenario", making an about-turn within a week of the two outfits issuing a Hindu unity call. Sources close to Natesan attributed the decision to "influence by state Congress leaders".

For the CPI(M), the support of



these outfits is important to consolidate the Hindu vote — Hindus constitute 55% of the population, as per the 2011 Census — as it did not get the support of Muslims in the 2024 Lok Sabha polls. It also wants to stop Ezhavas from mobilising for the BJP.

This also comes at a time when the BJP is trying to turn the Sabarimala gold scandal into an electoral issue. With the CPI(M)'s suffering in the 2019 LS polls due to its support for the entry of

women of menstruating age in Sabarimala, the party hopes to offset any damage this time with the help of SNDP and NSS.

Muslim outfits

In a state where Muslims make up 27% of the population, the support of the Jamaat has been a contentious matter between the LDF and the UDF. While the CPI(M) has targeted the Congress for accepting the Jamaat's support — Vijayan has

alleged that the outfit's core ideology is "fundamentally against secularism and democracy" — the presence of state minister V Abdurahiman and MLA Daleema Jojo at separate Jamaat functions provided the Congress with the ammunition to hit back. The Jamaat plays an important role in shaping the socio-political ideas of the community through its TV channel, newspaper, and publications in English and Urdu.

Another important minority community leader is AP Aboobacker Musliyar who is an influential voice in the Sunni community. He heads the AP faction of Samastha Kerala Jem-iyathul Ulama, an organisation of Sunni scholars. He is also a vocal critic of the Jamaat, accusing it of pursuing the ideological goal of creating an Islamic nation.

The Christian vote

The Christian vote — the community comprises 18% of

the population — has largely been with the UDF, while showing support for the Left in some pockets. This time, the BJP, with its Christian outreach, is also a claimant.

In a jolt to the UDF, the Kerala Congress (Mani), a party backed by Christians and one of its longstanding constituents, recently walked into the LDF. This has raised questions about which way the Christian vote will swing. In recent years, CAASA, which claims to have the support of 17 Christian denominations, has also come to the fore. The outfit, which its critics accuse of leaning towards the RSS, has often shared anti-Muslim sentiments with Hindu outfits. However, the local body elections did not indicate that the CAASA had any impact. Amid all this, the entry into the NDA of former major KITE's party Twenty20 is being viewed by some as the BJP's attempt to win over a section of Christians.

Dial down, Bangladesh should play in India

AN UNSPORTING spectacle is playing in the cricket arena, involving bans and ultimatums and brinkmanship. That this is unfolding between two nations and two neighbours with overlapping histories and cultural intimacies that have contributed to regional stability makes it even more of a self-goal for India and Bangladesh. Sports is not always insulated from politics, and it is true that India-Bangladesh ties are currently in a fragile moment. Even so, the ICC diktat that has forced Bangladesh out of the upcoming T20 World Cup, and the events that led up to it, showcase the takeover of an escalatory reactivity and a paralysis of long-termist diplomacy. This is more so in India, the much larger player, on and off the field.

Bangladesh's exclusion from the tournament comes after its government reiterated that its players would find it difficult to play in India because of "security concerns" after the BCCI asked the Kolkata Knight Riders to — unreasonably — remove Bangladesh seamer Mustafizur Rahman from its squad. The BCCI decision pointed to "recent developments", that is, the attacks in Bangladesh on religious minorities. The targeting of minority Hindus amid a weakening state authority on the watch of the Mohammad Yunus-led interim government is a serious concern. New Delhi has done well to flag this — loudly and clearly. But this categorical message is undermined when the BCCI, the behemoth, targets an individual player who has nothing to do with law enforcement or state policy, and when it is seen to be pandering to online troll brigades. In effect, this has only narrowed one of the few remaining spaces for people-to-people engagement, while reinforcing perceptions in Bangladesh of a heavy-handed Delhi.

Ever since the events of August 2024, when a students' uprising toppled the Sheikh Hasina government, India-Bangladesh ties have yet to recover their footing. Now, the February elections in Bangladesh offer a chance for both Delhi and Dhaka to turn the page. Even as Sheikh Hasina continues to find refuge in India — and she should — External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar's visit to Dhaka to attend Khaleda Zia's funeral, and his meeting with Tarique Rahman, her son and BNP chief, acknowledged that imperative. A Delhi-Dhaka reset will depend on both sides moving carefully — the "*ghuspaithiya*" rhetoric ahead of elections in Assam and West Bengal, and anti-India posturing by parties ahead of polls in Bangladesh, will be watched closely. In this precarious time, both countries must let cricket be. The Delhi-Dhaka relationship is too valuable to be hijacked by grandstanding or by letting hardliners run away with the ball. If both sides dial down and a Bangladesh XI plays in India, it will be a win-win.

Trump's foot soldiers unleash domestic terror

THE KILLING of Alex Pretti, a 37-year-old nurse, in Minneapolis by US Border Patrol agents — less than three weeks after the killing of Renée Good in the same city by an Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) agent — is shocking. Videos make it clear that a scuffle began when an agent pushed a woman and Pretti tried to intervene. He was pepper-sprayed, after which another officer fired 10 rounds into him. The Trump administration's defence — that Pretti intended to "do maximum damage and massacre law enforcement" — is contradicted by the video evidence. Equally disturbing is the speed with which officials labelled Pretti a "domestic terrorist" even before an investigation began. Good, shot dead at point-blank range, was also accused of "domestic terrorism".

Donald Trump returned to power on an aggressive anti-immigration platform, and over the past year, a headline federal enforcement strategy seems to have handed agencies like ICE and the US Border Patrol a blank cheque. Although they are legally mandated to enforce immigration laws in the interest of national security, the expansive powers they have been granted, in a climate of impunity, have led to a record number of detentions and deaths in ICE custody in 2025 — the most in two decades. The overreach of federal agents is now claiming US citizens with no criminal history as its victims.

Even though he said on Monday that he is "reviewing everything", the alacrity with which Trump has defended the federal agents suggests that accountability will be evaded. An independent probe is the only way forward. The federal government has prevented investigations by the state of Minnesota. The fatal shooting has brought the already fragile relationship between the federal and state governments to a tipping point. Under pressure from Democrats, the media and a handful of Republicans, Trump may yet call ICE and other agents off. But if the culture of impunity persists, it will lead to a severe erosion of trust between citizens and the government — a trust that is fundamental to the social contract that sustains a democracy.

When spirituality goes clubbing

IN HIS first "Mann ki Baat" of the year, Prime Minister Narendra Modi mentioned the trend of bhajan clubbing. It is the name given to a new wave of spiritual expression, where bhajans are being reimaged in a contemporary, club-style format — in the PM's words, it is about "spirituality and modernity merging beautifully".

Every generation interprets culture in ways that it can recognise and respond to. Bhajan clubbing is a modern twist to the call-and-response format, engineered for maximum crowd participation, especially from the young and the restless. In a world measuring its life by the gloss of social media, one that is roiled by political turbulence, bhajan clubbing appears like a tether, a way to connect with oneself, an attempt to reach one's roots. Sold-out shows by international kirtan artists such as Krishna Das and Radhika Das and the proliferation of bhajan-clubbing concerts across the country seem to attest to the fact that it has struck a chord with India's young.

For an older generation, bhajan clubbing is a throwback to the global counterculture movement of the Sixties that looked to the religious and cultural traditions of the East — yoga, meditation, classical music — for inspiration. The Beatles' famous retreat to Maharishi Mahesh Yogi's ashram in Rishikesh in 1968 to come to terms with their dizzying fame and find their way to inner peace was a turning point in their careers. It marked a shift in their music — captured most effectively in their *White Album* — and in how they thought of fame, nature, spirituality and creativity. Can bhajan clubbing, too, motivate something similar? A re-engagement with traditions beyond the spectacle, a moment of cultural shift once the novelty wears off? That remains to be seen.

As rules-based order crumbles, only reforms can shield the economy

2026 HAS BEGUN with a sense of cautious optimism that the economy is experiencing a cyclical upswing. Recent GDP prints have surprised to the upside, credit growth is accelerating and some surveys reveal business sentiment may be firming. Near-term buoyancy should not be surprising. The economy has benefitted from a raft of supports in 2025: GST and income tax cuts, monetary and regulatory easing, positive terms-of-trade impulses from lower crude prices, and a second successive strong monsoon. Together, these tailwinds are driving a cyclical lift. The real question is: What will it take for growth to remain strong once the cyclical impulses fade? To do so, the economy must successfully navigate two rotations.

The first rotation is of demand drivers. Post-pandemic growth was driven by a surge in public investment, a revival of the real estate sector, and strong service exports. But several of these impulses are fading. Central capex grew 30 per cent annually for four years post-pandemic but this pace was always going to strain the economy's absorptive capacity. So, central capex has downshifted to around a 10 per cent annual pace even as state capex risks being cannibalised by competitive populism. Meanwhile, residential real estate has slowed sharply over the last year, unsurprising because it was being driven narrowly by the upper echelon, who have likely reached some saturation point. For the recovery to sustain, demand needs to rotate towards the post-pandemic laggards of private consumption and private investment. What will this entail?

Urban and rural consumption have been in a game of whack-a-mole since the pandemic. Can they finally grow in unison? Rural consumption has lifted smartly in re-

cent quarters. Can urban consumption complement it? Autos have picked up nicely post the GST cuts, but the rest of urban consumption looks more tentative. Consumer durables production has lifted only modestly in recent months and much of the pick-up in personal credit growth is gold loans — underpinned by rising collateral from surging gold prices — suggesting it is more supply-driven than strong demand. Meanwhile, growth of the wage bill of listed companies has slowed from 15 per cent in 2022 and 2023 to mid single digits in 2025. The breadth and durability of the consumption recovery will, therefore, come down to whether household balance sheets and employment can strengthen enough in 2026.

Goods exports have been resilient in the face of punitive US tariffs, with exporters finding alternative markets. That said, non-oil export growth rates slowed to 3 per cent (in nominal dollars) by the end of last year. Exports therefore have their work cut out in 2026.

What does all this imply for private capex? In a world floating with Chinese excess capacity and riddled with US policy capriciousness, a broad-based private investment recovery will require both strong domestic demand visibility and animal spirits. It is unsurprising, therefore, that cash flow statements of listed companies reveal capex slowed in the first half of this fiscal year compared to last year, in contrast to market expectations. Instead, the fate of private capex hinges on the strength of the consumption and exports recovery. Can a durable recovery of the latter finally crowd in the former? That remains the \$4-trillion question for 2026.

Amid ICE crackdown, missing in action: Democrats

DONALD TRUMP'S ICE is terrorising American cities. Thousands are being snatched off the streets, and drivers are being pulled over by masked and warrantless ICE agents in unmarked cars. Peaceful activist and mother Renee Good was brutally murdered by ICE agents in Minneapolis. The public approval rating for ICE has plummeted since Trump took office, and a majority of Americans now disapprove of ICE. Trump's own popularity has cratered to an unprecedented low. Yet, the Democratic Party has refused to fight Trump and the Republican Party. This is because creating and funding ICE and super-exploiting migrant workers for Wall Street's greed have always been a bipartisan agenda.

The Democrats control the governor's office and majorities in both houses of the legislature in 16 states. They control the mayor's office in 67 of the 100 largest cities, many of which have experienced some of the most shocking attacks by ICE. These Democrats could declare today that their cities will stop all collaboration with ICE, and follow through. Data reveals that ICE arrests are substantially greater in states where police and other departments cooperate with and share data with ICE. Democratic mayors and city councils could pass emergency legislation banning local agencies from sharing data with ICE and enforce the law with serious penalties, including firing, for agency heads. Local Democrats could pass emergency legislation banning ICE and all other law enforcement officers from wearing masks. They can use their public platforms, which can reach millions of working people, to launch mass protests and civil disobedience.

The Democratic Party has failed to carry out a single one of these actions. In Minneapolis, the Democrats, led by Mayor Jacob Frey and Minnesota Governor Tim Walz, have allowed ICE to launch its dreaded Operation Metro Surge, which has unleashed 3,000 agents in the city. The Democratic Party controls Washington state, where I reside. Chillingly, the state's agencies allowed federal agencies such as ICE and Homeland Security to query the state's Department of Licensing database nearly 2.7 million times in 2025 alone.

Trump's ramping up of deportations is horrendous and dangerous. But it is part of a long-term agenda shared by Republicans and Democrats. The 4.4 million deportations plus border expulsions under Joe Biden exceeded those during any single presidential term since Republican George W Bush's second term. During the eight years of Barack Obama, over 3 million people were deported, more than all 20th-century presidents combined, earning him the title "Deporter-in-Chief". The Democratic Party is not a "lesser evil". Both parties are responsible for brutal attacks on immigrants and working people, atrocities around the world, imperialist wars, and the plundering of resources worldwide, which itself drives immigration.

Attacks on immigrants are endemic to this system, not only in the US, but globally. The capitalist class impoverishes indigenous communities and creates refugees and immigrants. Once the immigrants arrive in the economically advanced nation, it is in the capitalists' interests to oppress them to keep the working class divided. By keeping immigrant workers marginalised, paid lower-tier wages, and always fearful of deportation, the bosses can set the (low) bar for wages and working conditions. They pit native-born workers against immigrant workers in a continual race to the bottom. This is why we need international working-class solidarity against this anti-immigrant agenda.

In the US, we urgently need mass protests, peaceful civil disobedience, and strike actions. When Trump instituted his abhorrent Muslim travel ban in January 2017 during his first term, my socialist Seattle City Council office led the SeaTac airport shutdown, disregarding the objections of many Democratic politicians and operatives who opposed our mass civil disobedience. We need to bring that back to defeat Trump and both parties of the American billionaire class. Working people need to fight to win historic victories such as free healthcare for all by taxing the rich, national rent control, a \$25-an-hour minimum wage, and a permanent end to all US military aid to Israel.

Who decided 2016 was the last 'best year'?

IMAGINE IF the algorithm were a person, or well, a bunch of people, sitting in a backroom sifting through online content to curate your "For You" feed. They'd know you the best. One of them would chuckle at a particularly "dank" meme, maybe an inside joke that only you two share, before projecting it onto your screen. Except it isn't a person, but a machine that has learned to identify the content you like and react to.

So, who decided it was time to repost memories from 2016, the algorithm or us? Snapshots from a decade ago have reappeared everywhere on social media. It was the era before we had "looksmaxed", "aura-farmed", or "ate". 2016, now wearing Retrica's yellow-tint, appears like a simpler time.

The trend itself isn't new. Humans love to reminisce, and the algorithm has figured out that looking back keeps us scrolling. In 2019, we posted photos from 2009. In the early 2010s, #throwbackthursday became a weekly ritual. Instagram resurfaces photos from "Story" archives, while Google Photos compiles heart-warming videos from your old photos.

And as we generously romanticise the past, many assert that 2016 was the last "best year" — a claim contested by the politics of that year. Donald Trump came to power in the US. The UK left the European Union. And the Indian government decided to demonetise Rs 500 and Rs 1000 banknotes.

So, why does 2016 feel simpler than the equally tumultuous 2026? The answer may lie in what changed about social media that year. The algorithms that now feed us this nostalgia are the same ones that, in 2016, transformed the internet into a hyper-optimised, engagement-baiting ecosystem.

Facebook changed its News Feed in 2009 to prioritise "relevance" over chronological order, and soon, other platforms followed suit. In 2016, Instagram announced it would abandon chronological feeds in favour of algorithmic curation to show "moments we believe you will care about the most". Twitter, now X, introduced a similar feature to show "best tweets first". The effects of this shift have been measurable and profound. Research shows algorithmic curation can funnel users into echo chambers. Ragebait, moral panics and hot takes elicit strong reactions that spill offline. And the prioritisation of short-form video content has demonstrably impacted attention spans.

In the years since, the algorithm has received countless makeovers and AI-powered upgrades. Social media transformed from the town's message board into a parallel virtual space, and now, as bots and AI slop proliferate, it increasingly looks less human. When a trend goes viral now, it's nearly impossible to tell: Is this organic? Did the algorithm push it?

The nostalgia for 2016 seems to be driven by both. There's no denying that when you post your 2016 photo, it feels like an act of shared cultural experience. We choose to find connections on platforms designed to be isolating. And the algorithm? It may not have created the longing for 2016, but it recognised, packaged it, and sold it back to us as a trend. Perhaps in 2036, we will look back at 2026 as the best year.

Let's recover lost meanings of ganarajya to face political challenge of our times

GANARAJYA OR *ganatantra*? Our passport and the Indian Constitution name our republic as *ganarajya*. But our Republic Day is officially called Ganatantra Divas. A small discrepancy, you might think. Perhaps an oversight. Or, maybe a nuance. That is what my publisher thought, when I pressed him to change the title of my recent book from the proposed *Ganatantra ka Swadharma* to *Ganarajya ka Swadharma*.

This seemingly minor difference invites us to search deeper. These two terms allow us to distinguish between two different concepts for which the English language has just one word — “republic”. Once we extricate the concept of *ganarajya* from the more familiar and dominant concept of *ganatantra*, it opens the way to recovering the lost meanings embedded deep in the idea of a *ganarajya*. This recovery, in turn, sets us on a path to face the political challenge of our times.

I am not suggesting that one of the two usages is wrong. Unlike these days, the makers of our Constitution and the early guardians of our republic were very careful with their words. They must have had good reasons to call it “Ganatantra Divas” and not “Ganarajya Divas”. I am not saying that one of these words is more authentic. Sanskrit scholars tell us that both these words are pretty recent, 19th- or 20th-century, coinages. The “republics” in ancient India were called “*gana*” or “*sangha*”, not “*ganarajya*” or “*ganatantra*”. Nor do I claim a direct link between these words and the historical reality of ancient Indian *ganas*. Historians warn us against comparing these older political formations with modern democratic republics. The polities of Vaishali or Lichchhavi are best described as lineage-based oligarchies rather than democracies in our sense of the term.

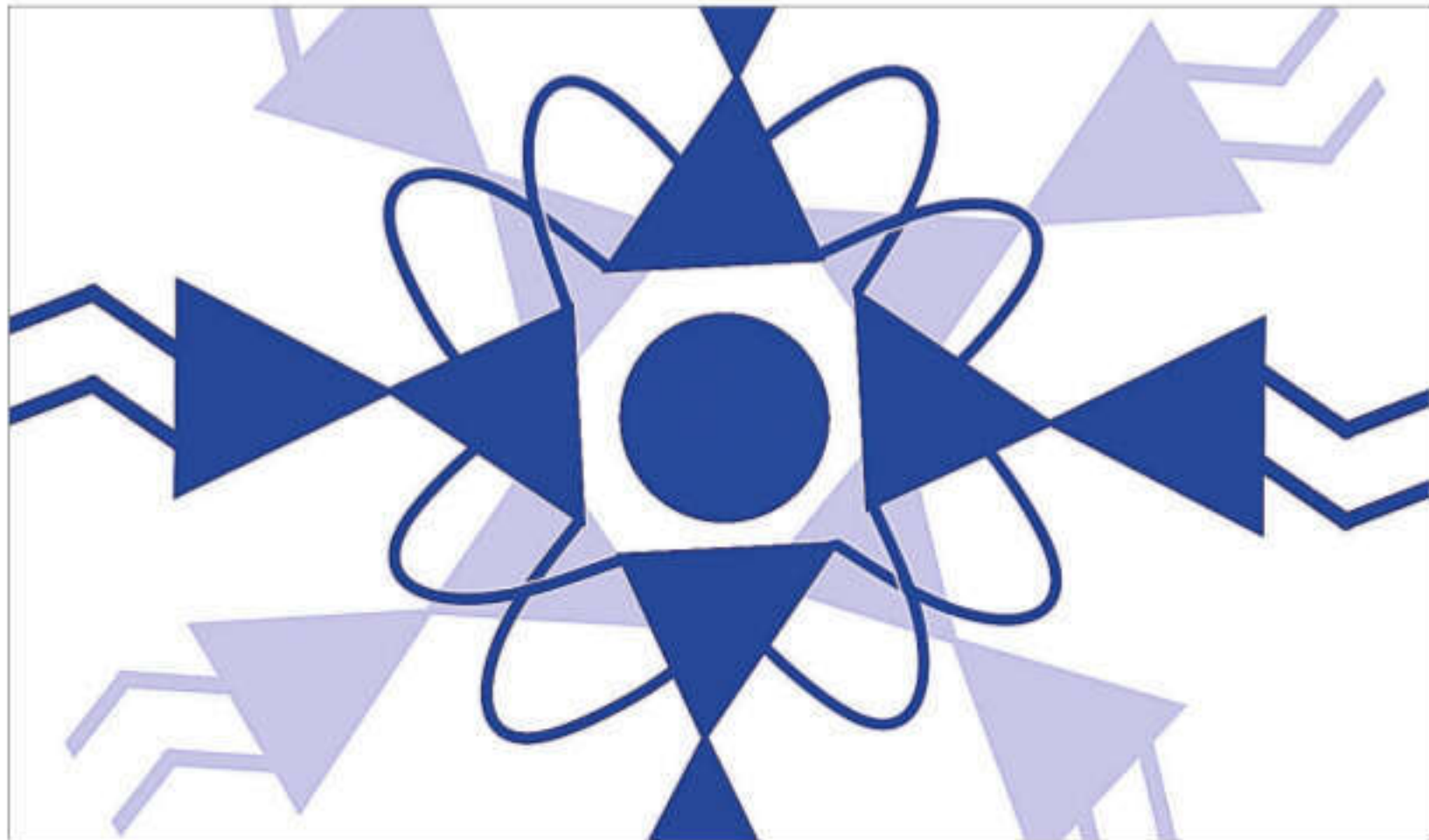

My point here is to underline the distinctiveness of these two terms and uncover their different political possibilities.

Ganatantra refers to a negative and very narrow meaning of a republic. Political Science textbooks tell us that a republic is a form of government where the head of state is not hereditary. Britain is ruled by a king, so it is not a republic. Nepal has done away with the king, so it is now a republic. This is simple and clear-cut. But it also renders the idea pretty much useless. Except for a handful of titular monarchies, virtually every country — democratic or otherwise — is a republic these days. An adjective that applies to nearly everyone is redundant. So is this concept of the republic. That is why students of Political Science do not use this concept in any meaningful way. We learn about it in our textbooks and forget about it.

Sometimes, *ganatantra* is used in a broader sense. It is used not just negatively to refer to the absence of monarchy but also positively to refer to the mechanism of popular sovereignty, the *tantra* of *gana*. Thus, it means the

institutional structure of electoral democracy through which popular sovereignty is exercised. In this broader usage, *ganatantra* is a near synonym of *lokatantra* or electoral democracy. Here again, *ganatantra* is repetitive and superfluous. No wonder *ganatantra* is a decorative expression that does very little in our political imagination.

Ganarajya takes us to deeper and positive meanings embedded in the idea of a republic. Here, the republic is a normative political order. The public is not just a collection; it is a community of equals. This community evolves its own norms, its distinct *dharma*. These norms are upheld by inculcating civic virtues. The people enforce these norms by holding the rulers accountable. The people are not just the source of power; they are also a check on power. In the European tradition, “republicanism” stood for this radical meaning of republic. In recent years, academic revival of “republicanism” in Western political theory has defined a republic not just as absence of monarchy but as absence of domination of any kind.

This radical concept of a re-

public is very much the republican idea upheld by the Indian national movement. The ancient Pali expression “*samanna-rajya*”, a polity where sovereignty is shared by equals, is close to this. In modern usage “*Jan-Gan-Man*” captures the spirit of our *ganarajya*. “*Jan*” stands for the people, the fountain head of sovereignty. “*Gan*” requires the people to be a political community where everyone exercises equal decision making power. “*Man*” is about the collective conscience. It is not mere public opinion at any given point of time, but the ethical ideas that the public upholds on deeper reflection. A radical republicanism informs the Indian Constitution.

Understanding this Indian concept of republic leads us to a question: What are the ethical ideals that inform the Bharat *ganarajya*? One could turn to the Preamble to the Constitution to unpack these ideals. But this may not work at a time when the Constitution itself is under assault. We have to go deeper and ask: Why must we believe in these constitutional values? An answer to this would take us beyond the Constituent Assembly. For our Constitution was not written in two years; the ideas that went into its making were forged over at least 100 years. It would take us beyond the freedom struggle, as the national movement was not just a movement to liberate the country from British colonial rule. It was also a movement for the reconstruction of India. It was an encounter between our civilisational heritage and Western modernity.

A search for the ethical ideals embedded in the idea of *ganarajya* invites us to uncover the *swadharma* of our republic. This is what the oft-quoted phrase “the idea of India” must mean. And that would lead us to a stark conclusion: What we confront today is not just a backsliding of our democracy, not just a mutilation of our Constitution. We face nothing short of a determined onslaught on the *swadharma* of our *ganarajya*. Defining and defending this *swadharma* must be our collective Republic Day resolve.

Don't bash Davos. Some things work, like this alliance for women

OVER THE past few days, we have seen some content bashing Davos. It needs no reminding that Davos is not, and should not be mistaken for, an end in itself. It is a catalyst. It is a moment — brief, concentrated, and intensely visible — where global attention converges. What matters is not the convergence alone, but what institutions, governments, and leaders choose to build in its wake.

It was in this spirit that, three years ago, on the sidelines of the Forum, I established the Alliance for Global Good as an independent platform focused on advancing women's economic participation, inclusive growth, and cross-sector collaboration. The intent was clear: To move beyond episodic interventions and towards systems-level solutions grounded in research, partnerships, and institutional accountability.

Since then, the Alliance has engaged with over 5,000 international delegations and collaborated with more than 12,000 industry stakeholders. Its work has been anchored in evidence, through over a dozen policy papers examining public health systems, climate transition economics, the care economy, and the structural barriers limiting women's participation in growth. These findings have travelled across international platforms and have informed national discourse, including their reflection in India's Economic Survey through our work on the care economy.

A defining principle of the Alliance has been the recognition that policy coherence and delivery capacity are inseparable. This understanding shaped SPARK — The 100K Collective, an initiative designed to enable 1,00,000 women entrepreneurs across 300 locations in India. Its focus is not charity, but capability — connecting women-led enterprises to skills, capital, markets, and regulatory systems that allow them to grow, formalise, and compete. Equally important has been attention to the less visible, but deeply consequential, systems that shape women's lives. In the area of maternal health, the Alliance encouraged the ICMR to develop a clinician usage protocol for an affordable postpartum haemorrhage drape. Developed at a cost of under \$1, this drape and the corresponding usage protocol show how institutional leadership, paired with frugal innovation and system adoption, can deliver life-saving impact at scale.

The Alliance has built four collaborations in Africa, Southeast Asia, the Middle East, and the US. Each is shaped by local context and unified by a commitment to women's economic participation and inclusive growth. This year's engagements in Davos reflected continuity and expansion. The WE Lead Lounge, now in its third year, has evolved into the Alliance's flagship convening platform. Across 14 structured conversations, 65 global leaders engaged with over a thousand participants on issues spanning health security, climate resilience, economic participation, and workforce transitions.

Several milestones marked this year's engagement. The unveiling of Laila Nutraceuticals' women's wellness initiative signalled a \$40-million commitment to integrating research with market delivery. The announcement of the \$100-million SPARK Fund, with early commitments already mobilised, is intended to accelerate women-led enterprises at scale. The report “Unlocking Her Wealth: The Untapped Economy” combined original analysis with evidence to deepen understanding of the undervaluation of women's work and its implications for economic participation. This was my fourth consecutive engagement with the Forum. My earlier journeys were shaped by the responsibilities of ministerial office. This year's engagement — as chairperson of the Alliance for Global Good — was different. It was less about voice and more about architecture: How ideas are translated into systems, how evidence informs collaboration, and how dialogue matures into delivery.

The strength of Davos lies not merely in who attends, but in how it reflects the state of the world. Heads of government, CEOs, and institutional leaders shared the global stage with civic groups, practitioners, youth collectives, and ordinary citizens. This plurality matters. Global attention is a finite resource, and when it gathers, it must be used to surface complexity, not flatten it. As the conversations from Davos recede, one principle remains clear: Progress is sustained not by momentary alignment, but by institutions that are designed to endure. The enduring value of Davos lies in how global attention is stewarded. When engaged with intent, it serves as a bridge between dialogue and design.

KASHI IS a city used to treating the world as a theatre for celebrating the timeless cycle of Life and Death. And Death, as Walter Benjamin says, is the sanction of everything that the storyteller can tell. The storytellers of Kashi are spread over various *ghats*, the oldest being Manikarnika Ghat. On the steps of these *ghats*, and at the tea shops and kiosks that line the roads leading to them, sit the garrulous denizens of this timeless city, ready with a story that, you later discover, was the preface to a deeper philosophical point. Or not. Because Kashi also has a great, somewhat brackish sense of humour.

The renovation of Manikarnika Ghat keeps the storytellers busy these days. But the rebuilding, and renaming of *ghats*, has been going on for a long time. The mercurial eastern rivers often wash away the earth under the structures, so the steps and bathing areas begin to show cracks and crumble. This holy work was mostly financed by rich pilgrims, such as the 18th-century trader Vacchhraj and Raja Man Singh of Amber in the 16th century. In the 19th century, the famed Jarasandh Ghat was restored by Meer Rustam Ali, the police head for Kashi, and renamed Meer Ghat.

In Kashi, renovation is also part of the eternal cycle

Maratha queen Ahilyabai Holkar, who built and restored many holy sites and temples, including the present-day Kashi Vishwanath temple. Ahilyabai's statue was shown in some widely circulated clips as lying among the debris. The Holkar family of Indore sent a note of protest and other groups, alleging the desecration of several temples, also jumped into the fray. The Chief Minister then visited the site and told the media that the queen's statue and some others were safe and would be reinstalled after the “Manikarnika Teerth Corridor” was rebuilt. He also asserted that the original demand for expanding and rebuilding the cremation grounds and the *ghats* had been made to the Prime Minister by the Dom Raja whose family has controlled the area for generations.

The area where the cremation grounds and sundry temples stand, the storytellers will tell you, predates history. Once upon a time, it was a dark place where the river banks ended and a dense forest began. The forests have since disappeared. A densely packed pilgrimage centre began surrounding what was once a secretive and sacrosanct space haunted only by sadhus, relatives of the dead waiting for cremation and, of course, the restless souls of the dead.

Till the time of Alauddin Khilji, Hindus were free to build temples to various manifesta-

tions of Lord Shiva. Later, when under the Lodhis of Delhi and the Sharqi sultans of Jaunpur, assertive Islam knocked at Kashi's doors, there was considerable destruction of old buildings. But the city had a great power to bounce back and rebuild. By the 17th century, a sort of ceasefire was declared.

During the decline and fall of the great Mughal Empire, the court of the Maharaja of Benaras, his Nagar Kotwal Meer Rustam Ali, and later the British Resident's house, became centres of classical discourses on oriental culture among the pandits, the Muslim nobility and the British orientalist. By 1734, the Maratha lords began a furious rebuilding of Kashi's holy *ghats* and temples. At the same time, quarrels and litigation over sharing taxes levied at the cremation *ghats* were common. One Kashmiri, miffed by the greed of the Doms of Dashashwamedha Ghat, brought his mother's body for cremation to Manikarnika and by way of gratitude rebuilt the *ghat* and started paying regular wages to the keepers.

Those days are gone. As one old singer, Pyare Ustad, sang: “*Nahin rahe woh Dara Sikandar, do din ki afsaree rahi/ Chale gaye sub Mulk e Adam ko, na khushki rahi, na taree rahi*” (Those great stalwarts are no more, their rule lasted but two days. Ultimately all left for Adam's final abode, after them things have been neither dry nor wet)."

THE CHURN in the Chinese military is not over — this was the message that reverberated through the halls of the Bayi Building in Beijing on January 20, during the plenary of the Central Commission for Discipline Inspection. Missing in action at the meeting was the second-in-command of China's highest defence and security decision-making body, Central Military Commission vice chairman Zhang Youxia. Four days later came the unprecedented announcement by the Chinese Ministry of National Defence, that Zhang, along with CMC member Liu Zhenli, have been placed under investigation for “serious violations of discipline and law”.

In the past few years, under the garb of corruption, it seems a factional war has played out within the People's Liberation Army (PLA). It likely pitted the “Shaanxi Gang” — led by Zhang Youxia and erstwhile discipline czar (now CMC vice-chairman) Zhang Shengmin — against the “Fujian Gang” of naval and Taiwan Strait war-planners. For a time it appeared the Shaanxi clique had won. They wielded the hammer of Xi Jinping's anti-corruption drive, potentially systematically targeting rival sources of power. But the latest signals from Beijing suggest a twist that few saw coming — the rule of the Zhangs is itself in jeopardy.

Corruption in the PLA is a feature, not a bug. It is baked into a system where state-owned monopolies practise “scientific gatekeeping” that is anything but

scientific. The “say it, do it” ethos that underpins Xi's legitimacy — the promise that the Party delivers results, whether in bringing back blue skies or poverty alleviation — was undermined by a procurement system defined by bid rigging, favours in personnel appointment, and *guanxi* (referring to interpersonal military-industry relations).

A highly likely theory is that Xi's response was the unleashing of the Zhangs.

Zhang Shengmin, as secretary of the CMC Discipline Inspection Commission, led the charge. The targets were specific: The likes of He Weidong, Miao Hua, and former Eastern Theatre Command leader Lin Xiangyang, who rose together in the erstwhile Fujian-based 31st Group Army as well as the PLA Navy — the very men entrusted with the Taiwan invasion plans. Their downfall was swift, prompted by allegations of “major duty-related crimes” and political disloyalty. This seemed to leave the Shaanxi faction, with its roots in the Army and the Rocket Force, as the last men standing. But in Xi's China, being the last man standing is a liability.

This perpetual churn has profound implications for global security. A military that is constantly looking over its shoulder cannot effectively prepare for

war. The dismantling of the Fujian gang has decapitated the leadership most familiar with the Taiwan Strait. Now, if Youxia is purged, the PLA will be left with a paralysed command structure, and the highest defence and security decision-making body — the CMC — will be the smallest it has ever been in decades, in terms of operational strength.

As one watches the dominoes fall, one thing is clear — that in the new era of the PLA, there is no safety, no immunity, and no end to the churn. The rule of the Zhangs may have looked absolute yesterday, but in Beijing, the ground is always shifting.

Security guarantees document from US is ready: Zelenskyy

A US document on security guarantees for Ukraine is completely ready and Kyiv is waiting for a time and place for it to be signed, President Volodymyr Zelenskyy said on Sunday, indicating that weekend talks with Russian in Abu Dhabi made some progress.

“For us, security guarantees are first and foremost guarantees of security from the United States. The document is 100% ready, and we are waiting for our partners to confirm the date and place when we will sign it,” Zelenskyy told a news conference during a visit to Vilnius, the Lithuanian capital.

“The document will then be sent for ratification to the US Congress and the Ukrainian parliament,” he said.

On Friday and Saturday, Ukrainian and Russian negotiators held their first trilateral meeting including US mediators in Abu Dhabi to discuss Washington’s framework for ending the almost four-year-old war, but no deal emerged.

However, Moscow and Kyiv both said they were open to further dialogue and more discussions were expected next Sunday in Abu Dhabi, a U.S. official told reporters immediately after the weekend talks.

“(In Abu Dhabi) the 20-point (US) plan and problematic issues are being discussed. There were many problematic issues, but now there are fewer,” Zelenskyy said.

He said Moscow wants to do everything possible to get Ukraine to abandon eastern regions Moscow has been unable to capture since its full-scale invasion that triggered the war. But Kyiv, he said, had not budged from its position that Ukraine’s territorial integrity must be upheld. “These are two fundamentally different positions — Ukraine’s and Russia’s. The Americans are trying to find a compromise,” Zelenskyy said, adding that all sides must be prepared to compromise, including the Americans.

Military-backed party wins Myanmar polls

MYANMAR’S MILITARY-BACKED Union Solidarity and Development Party claimed Monday that it had won the country’s first election since the army seized power in 2021, paving the way for a new government.

The victory of the party led by a former general was widely expected after the vote excluded major opposition parties and dissent was tightly restricted. Also, 25% of parliamentary seats were automatically reserved for the military — effectively guaranteeing control by the armed forces and its favored parties.

Critics say the polls organised by the military govern-

ment were neither free nor fair, but an effort to legitimise its rule after seizing power from the elected government of Aung San Suu Kyi.

The takeover triggered widespread opposition that dragged Myanmar into a civil war. The election was held in three phases on Dec. 28, Jan. 11 and Jan. 25. Of the country’s total 330 townships, 67 — mostly areas controlled by armed opposing groups — did not participate, reducing the original seats in the 664-member national parliament to 586.

Final results for all seats are expected later this week. After the results are finalized, the new members of Parliament and the military appointees will propose three candidates, and then elect one as president.

France honours fallen troops in Afghanistan

A SENIOR French government official said Monday the memory of the French soldiers who died in Afghanistan should not be tarnished following US President Donald Trump’s false assertion that troops from non-US NATO countries avoided the front line during that war.

Alice Rufo, the minister delegate at the Defence Ministry, laid a wreath at a monument in downtown Paris dedicated to

those who died for France in overseas operations. Speaking to reporters, Rufo said the ceremony had not been planned until the weekend, adding that it was crucial to show that “we do not accept that their memory be insulted.”

Ninety French soldiers died in the conflict.

“At such a moment, it is symbolically important to be there for their families, for their memory, and to remind every-

one of the sacrifice they made on the front line,” Rufo said.

Israel says remains of last hostage in Gaza recovered

ISRAEL SAID Monday it had recovered the remains of the last hostage in Gaza, closing a painful chapter for the country and clearing the way for the next and more challenging phase of its ceasefire with Hamas.

The most likely next step would be the reopening of Gaza’s border with Egypt, enabling Palestinians to move in both directions and for more aid to enter the territory devastated by two years of war. The ceasefire also calls for the deployment of an international security force, disarming Hamas, a further pullback by Israeli soldiers and the reconstruction of Gaza.

The announcement that the remains of police officer Ran Gvili had been found and identified came a day after Israel’s government said the military was conducting a “large-scale operation” in a cemetery in northern Gaza.

Netanyahu called it “an incredible achievement” for Israel and its soldiers. He said Gvili, who was killed during the Hamas-led attack on Oct. 7, 2023, that sparked the war, was among the first to be taken into Gaza.

“There are no more hostages in Gaza,” Netanyahu said Monday while addressing the Israeli parliament. “We have completed this mission, as I prom-

ised, and we will complete the other missions we have set.”

The return of all remaining hostages, living or dead, has been a key part of the Gaza ceasefire’s first phase. Gvili’s family had urged Israel’s government not to enter the second phase until his remains were recovered and returned.

Hamas said it now has committed to all terms of the cease-

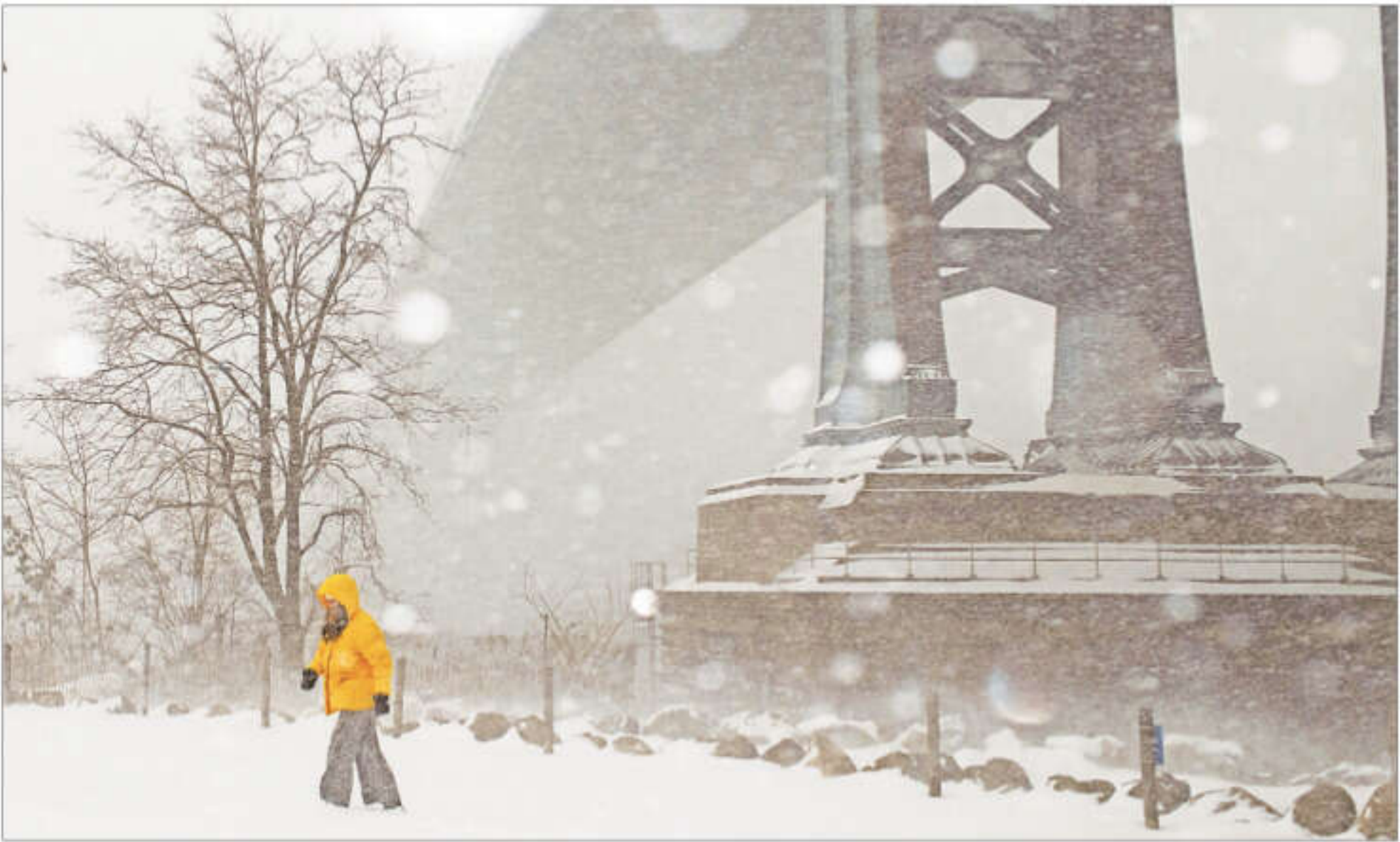

‘Monster Storm’ in US, 7 killed in jet crash

The airport, about 200 miles north of Boston, shut down after the crash. REUTERS

18 killed as ferry carrying over 350 people sinks off The Philippines

Manila: A ferry with more than 350 people on board sank early Monday near an island in the southern Philippines, killing at least 18 people, officials said. Rescuers saved hundreds more, while a fleet of coast guard and naval ships searched for those still missing.

Coast guard officials said the cargo and passenger ferry apparently encountered technical problems. The steel-hulled vessel abruptly tilted to one side and took on water, hurling people into the sea in the darkness, according to a rescued passenger.

Iran-backed militias signal will to attack amid high tensions with US

TWO IRANIAN-backed militias in the Mideast are signaling their willingness to launch new attacks, likely trying to back Iran on Monday as it worried about an approaching US aircraft carrier after President Donald Trump threatened military action over its crackdown on nationwide protests.

Yemen’s Iranian-backed Houthi rebels signaled a willingness to resume attacks on shipping in the Red Sea. That came just after Iraq’s Kataib Hezbollah paramilitary group, long supported by Iran’s para-

military Revolutionary Guard, issued a direct threat late Sunday toward any attack targeting Iran, warning a “total war” in the region would be a result.

However, both the Houthis and Kataib Hezbollah sat out from Israel’s 12-day war on Iran in June that saw the US bomb Iranian nuclear sites. The hesitancy to get involved shows the disarray still affecting Iran’s self-described “Axis of Resistance” after facing attacks from Israel.

A short video by the Houthis included images of a ship on fire, with the caption: “Soon.” It later aired footage Monday from its January 2024 attack in the Gulf of Aden on the Marshall Is-

lands-flagged tanker Marlin Luanda, one of the over 100 ships attacked as part of a campaign the Houthis said pressured Israel over its war against Hamas in the Gaza Strip. The Houthis halted their fire after a ceasefire in the conflict, though they’ve repeatedly warned they could resume fire if needed.

Meanwhile, Ahmad “Abu Hussein” al-Hamidawi of Kataib Hezbollah issued his own threat in a statement. “We affirm to the enemies that the war on the (Islamic) Republic will not be a picnic; rather, you will taste the bitterest forms of death, and nothing will remain of you in our region,” he said.

Ex-President Duterte fit for pre-trial hearings, rule judges

JUDGES AT the International Criminal Court have ruled that former Philippine president Rodrigo Duterte, 80, is fit to attend pre-trial hearings and will hold a confirmation of charges hearing on February 23, the court said on Monday. His defence had said that Duterte, who is being held in The Hague over murders committed during his war on drugs, could not stand trial due to cognitive decline. Judges said in a statement that a report by independent medical ex-

perts found that Duterte would be able to understand and participate in his case. They recalled that for someone to be deemed fit to take part in their case it is enough that they have a broad understanding of the procedures, not that they operate at their highest level. REUTERS

Gunmen open fire at soccer field, 11 killed

GUNMEN OPENED fire at a soccer field in central Mexico on Sunday, killing at least 11 people and wounding 12, authorities said. Salamanca Mayor Cesar Prieto said in a statement posted to social platforms that the gunmen arrived at the end of a soccer match. Ten people at the scene and one died later at a hospital. Prieto said the attack was part of a “crime wave” in the city and appealed to President Claudia Sheinbaum for help to control violence. REUTERS

Dhaka’s ex-police chief sentenced to death

FORMER DHAKA police commissioner and two other police officers were on Monday sentenced to death by a special Bangladesh tribunal for their alleged role during the 2024 violent street protests that led to then prime minister Sheikh Hasina’s ouster.

A three-judge panel of Bangladesh’s International Crimes Tribunal (ICT-BD), led by Justice Mohammad Golam Mortuza Mozumder, handed down the sentence to former Dhaka Metropolitan Police (DMP) com-

missioner Habibur Rahman, former DMP joint commissioner Sudip Kumar Chakraborty and additional deputy commissioner Mohammad Akhtarul Islam after their trial in absentia.

This is the second verdict delivered by the restructured ICT-BD which earlier handed down the death penalty to deposed premier Hasina and then home minister Asaduzzaman Khan Kamal. “These three (convicts) had superior status over their subordinates and are liable for superior command responsibility. They are found guilty and hereby awarded a single sentence of death,” the judgement said.

Meta, TikTok, YouTube to stand trial on youth’s screen addiction claims

META PLATFORMS, TikTok and YouTube will face courtroom scrutiny this week over allegations that their platforms are fuelling a youth mental health crisis, as the national debate about kids’ screen time enters a new phase.

The bellwether trial in California Superior Court, Los Angeles County involves a 19-year-old woman from California, identified as K.G.M., who says she became addicted to the companies’ platforms at a young age because of their attention-grabbing design, according to court filings. She al-

leges the apps fueled her depression and suicidal thoughts and is seeking to hold the companies liable.

Her lawsuit is the first of several cases expected to go to trial this year that center on what the plaintiffs call “social media addiction” among children. It will be the first time the tech giants must defend themselves at trial over alleged harm caused by their products, the plaintiff’s attorney Matthew Bergman said. “They will be under a level of scrutiny that does not exist when you testify in front of Congress,” he told Reuters.

The jury will decide whether the companies were negligent in providing products that

harmed K.G.M.’s mental health, and if her use of the apps was a substantial factor in her depression, compared with other causes such as the third-party content she viewed on the apps or aspects of her life offline.

“This is really a test case,” said Clay Calvert, a media lawyer at the American Enterprise Institute, a pro-business think tank. “We’re going to see what happens with these theories” that the social media platforms caused the plaintiff harm.

Mark Zuckerberg, CEO of Meta is expected to take the witness stand. The company will argue in court that its products did not lead to K.G.M.’s mental health challenges, Meta’s law-

yers told Reuters ahead of the trial. Snap CEO Evan Spiegel was also expected to testify, as his company was named a de-

fendant in the lawsuit. Snap (SNAP.N), opens new tab agreed on January 20 to settle K.G.M.’s lawsuit. A company spokesper-

son declined to comment on the specifics of the deal.

YouTube will argue that the company’s platforms are fundamentally different from social media platforms such as Instagram and TikTok, and should not be lumped together in court, a YouTube executive said ahead of the trial.

TikTok declined to comment about the company’s planned arguments in court.

As the trial begins, the same tech companies are mounting a nationwide effort to convince critics that their products are safe for teens. They’ve launched tools they say give parents more control over how their kids use the platforms and

have spent millions of dollars promoting those features.

Since at least 2018, Meta has sponsored parent workshops about teen online safety at dozens of high schools across the US. The company hosted one of those workshops, dubbed Screen Smart, in 2024 in Los Angeles, opens new tab, alongside National PTA President Yvonne Johnson and Meta safety chief Antigone Davis. National PTA is a nonprofit that advocates for child welfare.

TikTok also sponsored similar gatherings, opens new tab led by 100 local and regional PTAs, calling it Create with Kindness, according to the company’s website. The program in-

cluded tutorials on TikTok’s features for parents, including the option to limit screen time at night, according to the curriculum, opens new tab.

YouTube’s parent company Google in recent years has turned to Girl Scouts to convince the public it is invested in kids’ online safety. Girls can earn a patch, which features Google’s logo, opens new tab, to affix to their uniform after completing lessons about strong passwords, being kind online and digital privacy, according to the Girl Scouts website. The companies have also hired lawyers that have represented corporations in high-profile litigation involving addiction. REUTERS

DIFFERENT FROM EXISTING PLI SCHEME FOR HIGH-EFFICIENCY SOLAR PV MODULES

MNRE, FinMin discuss capex relief for wafer, polysilicon units

Progress under the PLI scheme has been slower in upstream segments of solar PV module manufacturing

THE MINISTRY of Finance and Ministry of New and Renewable Energy (MNRE) are in discussions to bring out a new capital subsidy scheme for the upstream segment of solar photovoltaic (PV) manufacturing, MNRE Secretary Santosh Kumar Sarangi told *The Indian Express*. The proposed scheme would be separate from the existing Production Linked Incentive (PLI) scheme for high-efficiency solar PV modules.

Sarangi said while solar module and solar cell manufacturing have grown in a desirable manner, upstream segments such as polysilicon refining as well as ingot and wafer manufacturing continue to face challenges. These, he said, stem from factors including high capital intensity and price pressures caused by aggressive pricing from China.

“We are now trying to advocate a slight tweak in the way in which support could be provided to these kinds of industries,” Sarangi said, adding that discussions on the proposal are currently underway with the Ministry of Finance.

The existing PLI scheme for solar PV modules covers both upstream — ingot, wafer and polysilicon — and downstream — solar cell and module manufacturing — segments. However, progress under the PLI scheme has been slower in upstream segments such as polysilicon refining and ingot and wafer production.

“Polysilicon is a highly electricity-intensive industry. The refining from silica to polysilicon is extremely electricity intensive. So, efforts will have to focus on sourcing low-cost electricity,” Sarangi said.

“Since it involves a huge capital expenditure to set up this kind of industry, a capex subsidy would be desirable. In that context, MNRE is now discussing with Ministry of Finance whether it is possible to have a different kind of scheme where capex is given for polysilicon and ingot-wafer projects that were sanctioned under the PLI but could not take off for a variety of reasons,” he added.

The solar PV cell manufacturing capacity in the country is around 27 GW, according to the information provided by Solar PV Manufacturing Associations. The installed ingot and wafer manufacturing ca-

capacity in the country is around 2 GW.

At present there is no commercial production of Polysilicon in the country, the Ministry had informed the Parliament.

“The country's solar PV module manufacturing capacity is sufficient to cater to domestic demand. However, for upstream stages like solar cells, wafers and polysilicon, domestic manufacturing capacity is not sufficient to meet domestic demand which necessitates imports,” the Ministry told the Parliament in December.

The MNRE further informed that the data from the Department of Commerce's Export-Import Data Bank shows that imports of solar PV cells,

wafers and polysilicon during FY25 were valued at around \$1,641 million, \$156 million, and \$0.03 million, respectively.

Launched in March 2021, the PLI scheme for solar PV modules aimed to install 65 gigawatts (GW) per annum of fully and partially integrated solar PV module manufacturing capacity.

The scheme was initially backed by an outlay of Rs 4,500 crore. In 2022, an additional budget allocation of Rs 19,500 crore was approved, bringing the total sanctioned outlay to Rs 24,000 crore across two tranches.

According to MNRE, the installed solar PV module manufacturing capacity in the

country, as per the Approved List of Models and Manufacturers (ALMM), is 121.7 GW, which includes 26.6 GW capacity under the PLI Scheme for high efficiency Solar PV Modules.

A joint report by Institute for Energy Economics and Financial Analysis (IEEFA) and JMK Research shows that operationalisation of PLI-awarded facilities has revealed significant implementation and execution gaps. While downstream segments such as module assembly have seen progress, upstream segments like wafer and polysilicon manufacturing have lagged behind.

The report, which was released in December 2025, also says that about 36% of India's total cell capacity and 24% of module capacity originate from PLI allocations.

According to the report, as of June 2025 the overall operational capacity achieved under the solar PLI scheme was approximately 29% of the total awarded capacity.

Module assembly exhibited the highest capacity-achievement rate at 59%, reflecting stronger progress in downstream manufacturing.

In contrast, the achievement rates for cell manufacturing (22%), wafer-ingot manufacturing (10%) and polysilicon manufacturing (14%) were significantly lower, indicating persistent barriers to upstream capacity realisation.

Trump's policies, sanctions turn central banks to gold, drive de-dollarisation

ON MONDAY, even as the US dollar fell to a four-month low, the price of gold crossed the \$5,000-per-ounce mark for the first time. The yellow metal's historic rally is showing no signs of slowing down and even the smartest and biggest institutions in the world — and not just small-time investors like households — continue to pile in on gold. One category of these smart and big investors are central banks.

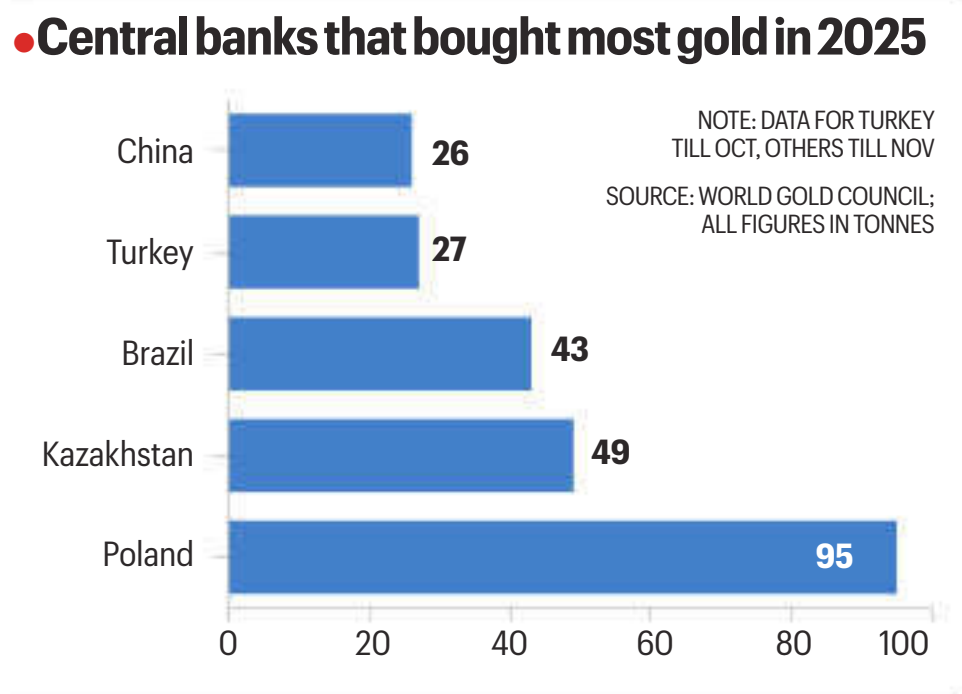
Take the Reserve Bank of India (RBI), for instance. Last week, data from the Indian central bank showed that its foreign exchange reserves were more than \$14 billion as on January 16 — the biggest weekly increase in 10 months. However, nearly a third of this rise was due to the RBI's gold kitty of 880 tonnes appreciating in value. Over the last one year, the value of RBI's foreign currency assets — which predominantly make up the forex reserves — have increased by just 5% even as total reserves rose 12%. What has been the primary driver? Gold, with the value of the RBI's holdings up 70%.

The RBI, though, hasn't even been the biggest buyer of gold over the last year. In fact, the RBI's gold holdings only increased by 4 tonnes or so in 2025. Leading the charge were central banks of Poland (95 tonnes), Kazakhstan (49 tonnes), and Brazil (43 tonnes), as per World Gold Council data until November 2025. But central banks buying gold is not news. What matters is gold's relative position in what these banks hold as reserves; the RBI, for example, now holds 17% of its forex reserves as gold, up from 12% a year ago. The reason, directly and indirectly, is US President Donald Trump.

Debasement of US dollar

In a note last week, economists from Morgan Stanley said that Trump's policies on trade and sanctions, among other factors, and the shift to a multipolar world are key to pushing people away from the US dollar. “On net, we think these factors are neutral to slightly accelerating this transition away from the dollar, but their evolution over the near term will likely be critical in determining the extent of this shift,” Morgan Stanley said.

Trump has made no secret about maintaining the US dollar's global supremacy, even threatening the BRICS nations with 100% additional tariff should they move forward with a common currency to “degenerate” and “destroy” the dollar.

De-dollarisation, after all, can shift the balance of power away from the US and weaken its ability to shape the world economy and global financial markets in its image. At the same time, everything Trump has done has weakened the greenback's status in the eyes of foreign beholders, with the result being that the US dollar weakened by 9% in 2025 — the most in almost a decade. This has helped drive the rise in gold prices, with the demand for safe-haven assets on the up amid Trump's sabre-rattling and policy uncertainty.

Weaponising flows

According to JP Morgan analysts, de-dollarisation has been most visible in commodity markets. In a note last year, the investment bank said that “a large and growing proportion of energy is being priced in non-dollar-denominated contracts”. However, this is also showing up in sovereign debt. The RBI, for instance, has sharply lowered its holdings of US government bonds: in November 2025, holdings by India stood at \$186.5 billion, down for the sixth month in a row. In November 2024, the figure was \$234 billion. Meanwhile, China's holdings of US government debt are at a 16-year low.

Others are threatening more vocally. Last week, Danish pension fund AkademikerPension said it plans to get rid of its holdings of US Treasuries by the end of January, with Trump's talk of taking over Greenland being one of the several reasons for the move, including the unsustainable finances of the US government. This followed three other pension funds from Denmark who have taken a dim view of US government bonds. The weaponisation of capital flows was warned by Deutsche Bank earlier this month, when it said in a note that Trump's threats against Europe could lead to the

continent cutting its holdings of US debt. “Markets are increasingly discussing the de-dollarisation theme,” Nomura analysts said in a note on January 21.

Trump has already promised “big retaliation” in response to European countries dumping US government bonds. The European Union held around \$10.4 trillion of US portfolio assets — accounting for 29% of foreign ownership of these assets — as of November 2025.

The past and future

The diversification of forex reserves away from the dollar and assets denominated in it received a big push after the US froze Russia's reserves following its invasion of Ukraine in February 2022. But signs of de-dollarisation, or at least a gradual shift away from the greenback, have been visible for some time. According to data from the International Monetary Fund (IMF), 2024 saw the share of the US dollar in global forex reserves fall to an over-30-year low of 58.5%. In 1999, this number stood at 71%.

“Meaningful de-dollarisation would have profound implications for the global security architecture, reducing the United States' capacity to fund its military and impose coercive economic pressure,” Ali Ahmadi, Director of Geoeconomics & Sanctions, ReshapeRisk and Executive-in-Residence Fellow at the Geneva Centre for Security Policy, said last year.

For the foreseeable future, though, the US dollar remains by far the most dominant currency, with 89% of total turnover of over-the-counter foreign exchange instruments denominated in US dollars. But if the Trump administration and the President himself continue in the same vein, more meaningful change could become evident.

US govt invests in another rare earth miner

Washington: The US is taking a minority stake in Oklahoma rare earth miner, USA Rare Earth, as it seeks to minimise its reliance on imports of a key material for smartphones, robotics and EVs.

China processes over 90% of the world's critical minerals and has used its dominance to gain leverage in the trade war with Washington. USA Rare

Earth said Monday that the US Commerce Department is investing \$1.6 billion in the company to advance work on a mine in Texas and to build a magnet manufacturing facility in Oklahoma.

The agreement includes \$277 million in proposed funding and a \$1.3 billion senior secured loan. The Commerce Department will get 16.1 million

common stock in return, and rights to buy 176 million more.

“USA Rare Earth's heavy critical minerals project is essential to restoring US critical mineral independence,” Commerce Secretary Howard Lutnick said in a statement. “This investment ensures our supply chains are resilient and no longer reliant on foreign nations.” AP

India before FY27 Union Budget

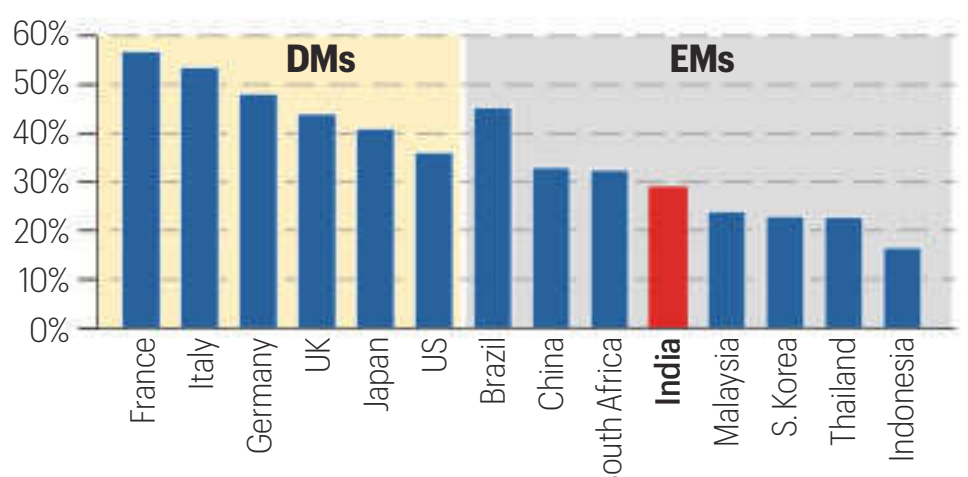
Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman will present the FY27 Union Budget on Feb 1. Certain aspects of the economy, that has been in a 'goldilocks' phase, are worth examining. In a report this month, BofA Securities' economists Rahul Bajoria & Smriti Mehra raised 10 questions, 3 of which are given below.

Does the government spend too much?

● The size of the 2025-26 Union Budget was Rs 50.65 lakh crore. While it is thought that government spending does not have the impact it should, Bajoria and Mehra point out that the quality of government spending has improved significantly in the last

25 years, coinciding with greater money being transferred to states. When compared with other countries, India spends around 30% of GDP. While this is in line with a few EM peers, it's lower than South Africa, Brazil, and China.

Government expenditure (% of GDP)

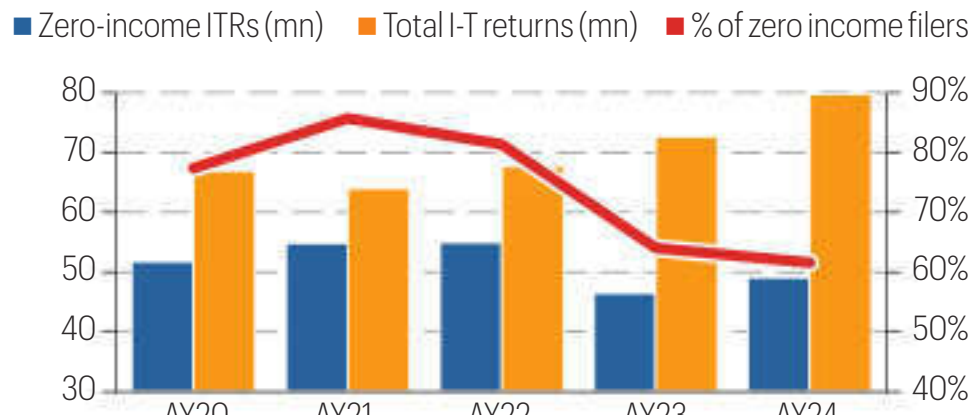


Is India taxed too much?

● Government's spending hinges on tax collections. India's direct tax-to-GDP ratio — at 7.6% — is one of the lowest among EM and DM peers even though the marginal-I-T and corporate tax rates are among the highest. The problem is a small

tax base. “India has around 80 million people who filed taxes in AY24, but majority remains zero-income filers. However, the number of non-zero income tax filers have doubled over the last five years,” according to the report.

Income tax filers in India (in mn)

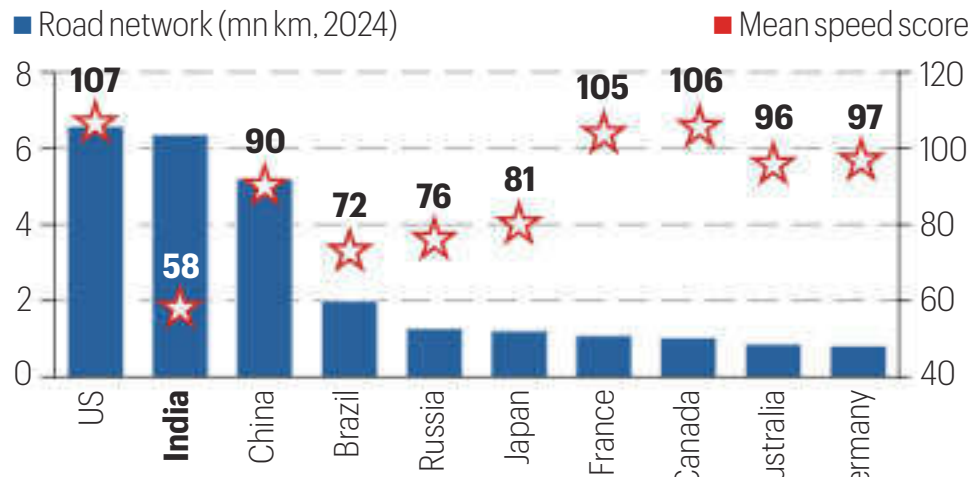


Is India done with basic infra spending?

● The government has pushed hard on capex in recent years to build physical infrastructure, with the target for 2025-26 set at Rs 11.21 lakh crore, over 3 times the spending in 2019-20. So, is

the government's job done? No, according to Bajoria and Mehra, who think India is entering a “new, expansive phase” which will see improved resource availability, spending ability, and execution.

SEBI survey: Why just 3.21 cr Indian households invest in securities markets

OUT OF India's 33.72 crore households, only 3.21 crore, or 9.5%, have investments in products like equities, mutual funds, and corporate bonds, according to an investor survey by the Securities and Exchange Board of India (SEBI). This leaves around 30.51 households still outside the securities market, signalling a significant under-penetration.

The low percentage of household participation in the securities market comes despite a multifold increase in market capitalisation and assets under management in the last 10 years, the survey highlighted. BSE equity market capitalisation has surged from around Rs 101 lakh crore in FY15 to nearly Rs 4,701 lakh crore by October 2025. During the same period, MF assets under management expanded from Rs 12 lakh crore in 2015 to Rs 79 lakh crore in September 2025.

Awareness of securities market products remains concentrated around established instruments, with MFs/exchange traded fund (ETF) (53%) and listed equities (49%) being the most widely recognised securities market products among households. “Currently,

about 6.7% of Indian households report holding mutual funds or exchange-traded funds (ETFs), and approximately 5.3% hold direct equities, which clearly indicates that participation in market-linked instruments is limited,” the survey showed.

The survey stated that household awareness of complex securities market products such as corporate bonds, futures and options, Real Estate Investment Trusts (REITs)/Infrastructure Investment Trusts (InvITs) and Alternative Investment Funds (AIF) remains limited. While F&O are recognised by 13% of households, household penetration of this complex product is less than 1%.

Geography plays a substantial role in shaping awareness patterns. Urban households report 74% awareness of at least one securities product, compared with 56% in rural areas. The penetration is highest in the top nine metros at 23%, followed by 10-40 lakh towns (16%) and 5-10 lakh towns (14%).

Delhi leads with 21%, followed by Maharashtra at 17%, Goa at 16% and Gujarat at 15%. Nagaland (3%), Uttarakhand and Meghalaya (4.5%) recorded the lowest participation.

'Bangladesh panel says Adani power deal overpriced, flags procedural flaws'

AN ADANI Power coal-fired plant that exports electricity passes on Indian corporate taxes to Bangladesh and charges more than market rates, according to a recent report from a government-appointed committee in Bangladesh. Adani's Godda plant in Jharkhand priced power at a 39.7% premium over its nearest private-sector competitor and had the steepest cost escalation among electricity import arrangements from India, the National Review Committee (NRC) said in a report dated January 20. Reuters reviewed the report, which has yet to be made public.

The NRC said the price divergence was an “outcome of specific contractual choices,” adding that it had found evidence of “serious anomalies in the procedures through which the contract was awarded.”

Adani Power said it could not comment on the review as the committee had neither consulted the company nor provided it with a copy of the report. The company also said it was continuing to supply electricity despite large payment dues, adding that other generators had cut back or stopped their supplies.

SOME LVMH shareholders are seeking clarity on how and to whom Bernard Arnault plans to hand over leadership of the luxury giant he has been steering for almost 40 years, saying the lack of transparency is increasingly becoming a risk for the group.

Arnault, who oversees the \$350 billion group spanning over 70 brands including Dior and Tiffany, has five children involved in the running of his luxury empire but has shown no sign of wanting to retire. At 76, he has yet to pick a successor. Questions have long swirled in corporate Europe about who

will succeed Arnault, France's richest man who last April extended the age limit for his combined CEO and chair role for a second time, to 85.

In the strongest public comments to date on the issue, some of LVMH's shareholders told Reuters the unresolved succession issue has become a liability for the company.

“The succession planning, as of now, appears unclear and opaque,” said Stefan Bauknecht, equity portfolio manager at Deutsche Bank's DWS, LVMH's 12th-largest shareholder according to LSEG data. “We want more transparency and a plan on how things will evolve.”

“Ten years ago, succession

was not a pressing issue. Today, it has become a risk factor and leads to a governance discount on the company,” said Ariane Hayate, European Fund Manager at Edmond de Rothschild

in Paris, which holds LVMH stock.

LVMH, which is due to report annual results on Tuesday, said in detailed responses to Reuters' questions that succes-

sion plans for its executives aren't public, but “obviously they do exist”, without referring specifically to Arnault's role.

Plan seldom discussed

Investors said the latest age extension appeared to be an attempt to buy Arnault time to decide.

“They (LVMH) probably can't give the clarity because he doesn't have clarity in his own mind,” said Paul Moroz of Mawer Investment Management, another LVMH investor. “You really don't know until it's done, but it's probably low odds it works out.”

Arnault has indicated the subject is not top of his agenda. “Talk to me again in 10

years, I can give you a more precise answer,” he told CNBC in December. “As in every family, at one point, there is a succession but I hope that, unless I get the ball on the head in a tennis court, I will make these 10 years.”

Reuters interviewed seven institutional investors, six of them LVMH shareholders. All of them said they had no idea about the company's succession plans, with four describing the lack of clarity as problematic. “I am unaware of any emergency plan, for example a group of caretakers who would activate quickly and secure Arnault's legacy. Such things are simply missing,” Bauknecht said.

India to expand its hypersonic arsenal with LR-AshM missile

ONE OF the many highlights of the 77th Republic Day Parade was the Defence Research and Development Organisation's (DRDO) Long Range Anti-Ship Hypersonic Missile (LR-AshM), showcased for the first time. We explain the features and capabilities of this hypersonic glide missile, and also what other hypersonic missiles India is developing.

LR-AshM: The hypersonic glide missile

The missile system is designed to meet the coastal battery requirements of the Indian Navy. The LR-AshM is capable of engaging static and moving targets and is designed to carry various payloads to a range of around 1,500 km. This missile follows a quasi-ballistic trajectory with hypersonic speeds starting at Mach 10 (multiples of speed of sound) and maintaining average Mach 5 with multiple skips. Ballistic missiles are boost-powered initially and then travel unpowered on a high, arched trajectory. Quasi-ballistic missiles begin ballistically but fly lower and manoeuvre in flight to change course and evade interception. As this missile flies at low altitudes with high speed and manoeuvrability, enemy ground and ship-based radars cannot detect it. The LR-AshM is configured with a two-stage solid propulsion rocket motor system. These propulsion systems boost the missile to the required hypersonic velocities. Stage-I of the vehicle is separated after it is spent. After Stage-II burnout, the vehicle performs an unpowered glide with required manoeuvres in the atmosphere before engaging the target, the DRDO has said.

Army and Air Force versions of these missile and ship-fired versions for the Navy are also said to be either under consideration or under development. With its versatility, it could well place India in the hypersonic arms domain."

One of the known successful tests of the missile was done by DRDO on November 16, 2024 off the coast of Odisha. As part of the further development cycle, the missile warhead and sensor mechanisms will be integrated soon, before its induction into the Navy in two to three years.

Other hypersonic cruise missiles

Amidst cutthroat global competition in hypersonic weapons, DRDO is working on two key hypersonic technologies. One is hypersonic glide and another is hypersonic cruise. LR-AshM is a hypersonic glide vehicle and includes in itself major achievements in indigenous technologies like materials and control systems needed for sustained hypersonic flight. Hypersonic cruise missiles fly within the atmosphere at hypersonic speeds using scramjet engines for sustained powered flight and manoeuvrability. Ramjets are air-breathing engines that compress incoming air using forward motion, with fuel igniting in a combustion chamber; they require an assisted take-off and work best around Mach 3, losing efficiency at hypersonic speeds. Scramjets improve on ramjets by keeping airflow supersonic in the combustion chamber, enabling efficient operation above Mach 5, but are far more complex to design and operate.

In China's series of purges, why latest one stands out

FOR MONTHS now, reports of China purging senior military officials have frequently made headlines. Even then, the investigation into the only remaining Vice Chairman of China's apex military decision-making body — for "suspected serious violations of discipline and law" — marks an unprecedented development. Zhang Youxia, 75, is a veteran leader. He joined the People's Liberation Army (PLA), the military arm of the Chinese Communist Party (CCP), in 1968. Zhang was not only professionally associated with Chinese President Xi Jinping, but is also known to share personal ties with him. Their fathers were senior party leaders who knew each other. *The Wall Street Journal* claimed Sunday that he was accused of "leaking information about the country's nuclear weapons program to the US". If true, this would be an extraordinary charge. There are also other theories floating around his removal. Officially, past purges have been justified as cracking down on corruption. Past incidents also indicate that reprieve is unlikely after an investigation begins, and Zhang will be removed from his post. This effectively means that the seven-member Chinese Central Military Commission (CMC) now has only two people: Xi Jinping himself, as the CMC Chairman, and Zhang Shengmin, the other CMC Vice Chairman. Shengmin was appointed to the post just three months ago, when his predecessor, He Weidong, was also purged.

Why this probe is noteworthy First, there is the seniority of the people involved. Zhang Youxia holds the senior-most army rank, that of general. He was also a member of the Political Bureau of the Communist Party Central Committee, which is among the top political bodies in China. Apart from Zhang, the investigation will also include fellow CMC member Liu Zhenli, 61, the chief of the CMC's Joint Staff Department. A *South China Morning Post* report said that both Zhang and Liu are "decorated war heroes" and participated in PLA campaigns against Vietnam in the late 1970s.

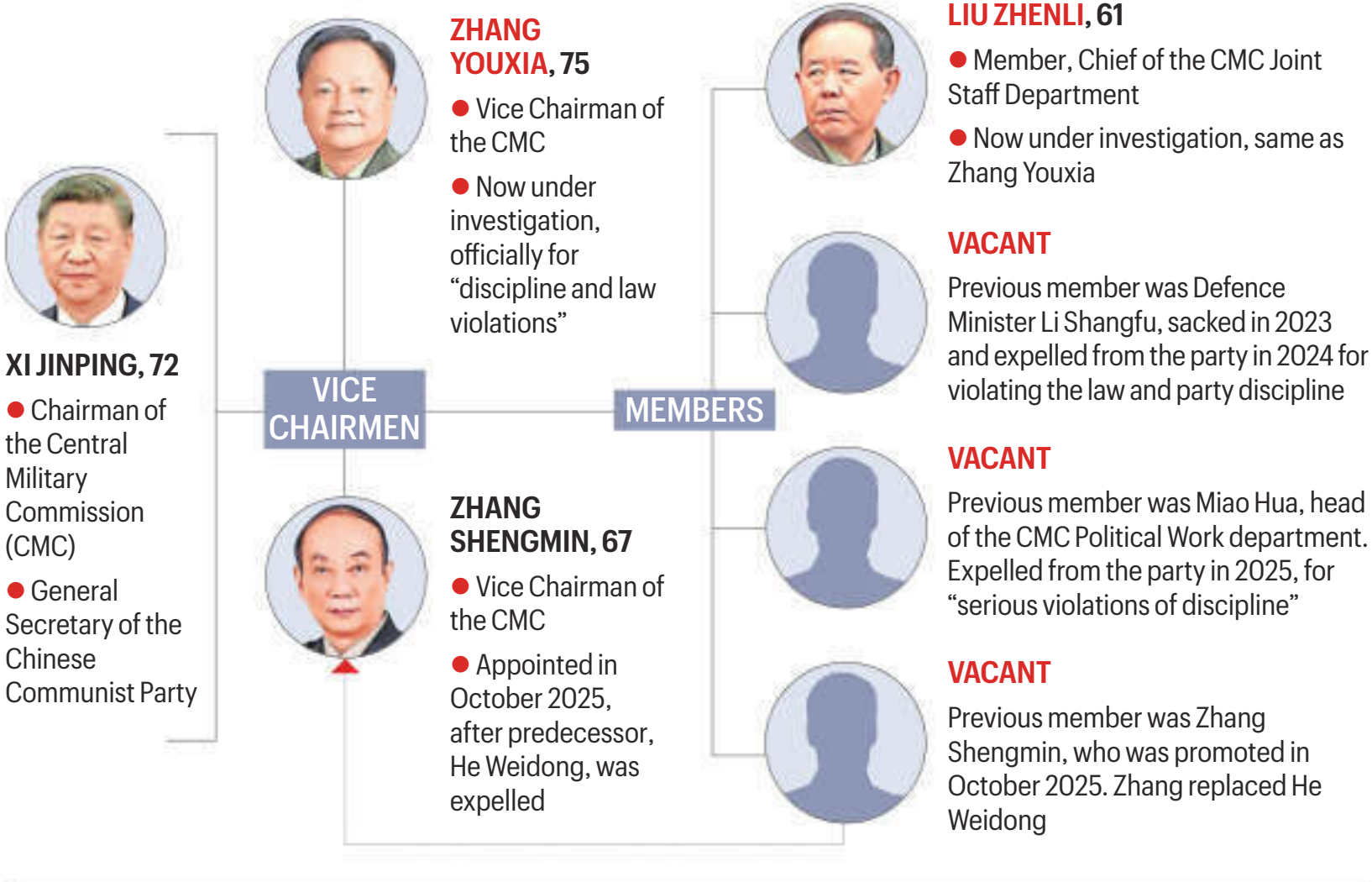

Month ago, Pentagon flagged PLA 'disruption' from removals

OVER THE weekend, China's most senior army officer, General Zhang Youxia, was reported to be under official investigation. A report from *The Wall Street Journal* stated that it stemmed from allegations of leaking information related to the country's nuclear weapons programme to the US.

The Pentagon's most recent annual report on China's armed forces specifically flagged the removal of senior officers of the People's Liberation Army (PLA) having "caused uncertainty over organisational priorities" and "reverberated throughout the ranks of the PLA". The report, published in December, said corruption in Chinese defence procurement had led to "observed" capability shortfalls, such as malfunctioning lids on missile silos.

"These investigations very likely risk short-term disruptions in the operational effectiveness of the PLA... Alternatively, the PLA could emerge as a more proficient fighting force in the future if it uses the current campaign to eliminate systemic issues enabling corruption," the Department of Defence's annual report on military and se-

curity developments relating to the People's Republic of China had said.

Top general under lens

Zhang is the vice-chairman of the Central Military Commission (CMC), China's supreme military command body, serving as the second-most senior officer under President Xi Jinping, and has long been regarded as Xi's closest ally within the armed forces. China's defence ministry said it had opened an investigation into the country's highest-ranking general over "grave violations of discipline and the law", without any further details about accusations against General Zhang. In its announcement, the ministry said another senior military officer, General Liu Zhenli, was also under investigation.

Their removal follows the expulsion of nine top generals in October: one of the largest public crackdowns on the military in decades. With the latest purge, the CMC is now down from the original seven members to just two: Xi, who is the chair, and Zhang Shengmin, who is responsible for the military's disciplinary affairs.

Early into its annual report on military and security developments of China, the

Pentagon inserted a section titled 'PLA Corruption Developments'. "The PLA has continued to experience corruption-related investigations in every service, which have led to the removal of dozens of general officers. By late 2024, corruption issues had again reached the level of the CMC. Additionally, multiple senior officers and defence industry executives have not been seen attending public events, suggesting that additional corruption investigations remain in progress," the Pentagon report said.

According to the WSJ report, the allegations were outlined during a closed-door briefing on Saturday attended by senior military officers, shortly before China's Ministry of National Defence announced an investigation into Zhang Youxia. The Ministry said Zhang was suspected of serious violations of party discipline and state law, without elaborating on the charges.

CMC members' purge

Beijing has detained or suspended multiple members of its Central Military Commission. In March 2025, CMC Vice Chairman He Weidong was reportedly detained and has not made any public appearances since the end of the National People's

Congress in early March last year. As one of two CMC vice chairmen, he shared responsibility with Vice Chairman Zhang Youxia for direct oversight over the 15 departments, commissions, and offices of the CMC.

"He's likely detention indicates how over a decade into Xi's anti-corruption campaign, corruption still extends to even the most senior officers who have been promoted during Xi's tenure. In November 2024, Admiral Miao Hua — head of the CMC Political Work Department (PWD) and the PLA's top political officer — was publicly suspended from duty on suspicion of "serious violations of discipline." Miao had authority over political education, party organisations within the military, and had overall responsibility for "maintaining loyalty within the PLA".

Investigations into these military leaders indicate Beijing is willing to purge the military of perceived disloyalty, regardless of the disruptive impact on the PLA.

The total number of PLA leaders removed for corruption or other unprofessional conduct is hard to assess, but expulsions from party and state bodies are a barometer for measuring the extent of the removals.

India has most road accident deaths in the world. Can 'talking cars' curb these?

THE UNION government is planning to launch a "vehicle-to-vehicle (V2V)" safety system to prevent road accident deaths and reduce traffic.

V2V communication is a wireless technology that enables vehicles to communicate, or "talk", with one another. This essentially means that vehicles can share real-time information such as speed, location, acceleration and braking with each other.

At a meeting of the Parliamentary consultative committee on January 22, Union Minister Nitin Gadkari said the Department of Telecommunications has allocated the 30 GHz radio frequency for the development of such communication systems.

The V2V system is similar to the aviation sector technology where aircraft broadcast their position, speed, altitude, and the nearby aircraft and ground stations receive it. This system has been a crucial part of the aviation sector across the world. In the roads

sector, however, it is still a work in progress. The V2V system is in place in only a few countries, mostly developed ones.

How will the system work?

According to officials from the Ministry of Road Transport & Highways (MoRTH), an On-Board Unit (OBU) will be installed in cars so that they can exchange information with nearby vehicles wirelessly. This unit will alert the driver about black spots, obstacles, parked vehicles on roadsides, fog or any potential threats.

Usually, V2V systems can detect vehicles in a 300-metre range. For instance, if a car applies brakes suddenly, nearby vehicles will get an alert to slow down. This could help in reducing crashes.

India ranks first in the world in total road accident fatalities, far ahead of second- and third-ranked countries: China accounts for just 36%, and the US 25%, of India's road deaths. MoRTH Secretary V Umashankar said the OBUs will cost between Rs 5,000 and Rs 7,000. These will be first installed in

new vehicles. "This will have a significant impact on road safety. Many times, trucks and cars are parked on the roadside, and the speeding vehicles collide with them, which

leads to casualties. We will be able to reduce such accidents, since OBU will automatically issue the warning," said Umashankar at a press conference on January 8.

When will it be rolled out?

The government has not yet announced a specific date for rolling out this system. However, it is the ministry's key initiative as part of its road safety programme for the year. The secretary said the ministry is setting standards for it in collaboration with original equipment manufacturers (OEMs). A joint task force has also been constituted with the telecom department.

"After the decision on the standards, we will issue a notification. Initially, the new vehicles will be required to install these on-board units. After that, the old vehicles will be fitted with this. Under the National Frequency Allocation Plan, the Department of Telecommunications will provide free spectrum. So the OEMs would be able to use this spectrum and get it installed in the vehicle. Our aim is to get it implemented this year," said the MoRTH secretary.

What are the challenges?

The V2V system has some limitations and privacy concerns. The frequency band

allocated for the system might not support all vehicles. This means that incorrect information can lead to accidents and deaths.

The other issue is that it will store a large amount of data — about the vehicles, their location, details about the driver, etc. This puts the whole intelligent transport infrastructure at potential risk of being misused. It would certainly require government regulations and rules to implement. Cyber attacks are another concern for this system.

Which countries use V2V?

The US is the leader in V2V communication systems research and its implementation, with strong regulation. Models like the Volkswagen Golf 8 and the Cadillac models in the US come with this tech.

European countries such as Germany, France and the UK, too, are incorporating V2V into new vehicles and smart city projects. China is another major adopter of V2V. Countries such as the UAE, Saudi Arabia, Brazil and Mexico are in early pilot stages to roll out V2V systems.

PCB defers
World Cup call,
India match
boycott looms

THE PAKISTAN Cricket Board (PCB) has deferred its decision on participation in the upcoming T20 World Cup, with chairman Mohsin Naqvi saying a final call will be taken either on Friday or by Monday.

Naqvi met Pakistan Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif on Monday and said the issue was discussed in detail. "Had a productive meeting with the Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif," Naqvi tweeted. "Briefed him on the ICC matter, and he directed that we resolve it while keeping all options on the table. It was agreed that the final decision will be taken either on Friday or next Monday." His comments came days after he said the decision on sending the team to Sri Lanka for the T20 World Cup would be taken after consultations with the government.

While Pakistan have already announced their squad for the tournament, scheduled to begin on February 7, speculation over their participation has intensified. The controversy began after the PCB supported Bangladesh's decision not to travel to India during an ICC board meeting. Bangladesh were subsequently dropped from the T20 World Cup and replaced by Scotland, prompting Pakistan to accuse the ICC of double standards, citing India being allowed to play the Champions Trophy at a neutral venue.

Although the PCB has not officially indicated that it may pull out of the tournament, reports from Pakistan suggest multiple options are being considered. One possibility is Pakistan refusing to play their group-stage match against India on February 15 in Colombo. Grouped with India, Namibia, the USA and the Netherlands, Pakistan would forfeit two points if they skip the match and could also face ICC sanctions, given that an India-Pakistan clash is the tournament's most commercially valuable fixture. The match is scheduled to be played in Colombo under an arrangement between the two boards that fixtures involving both teams in ICC tournaments hosted by either country are to be held at neutral venues. However, there is also uncertainty over the prospect of the two teams meeting in the knockout stages.

Amid the uncertainty, former Pakistan cricketer Basit Ali has urged the PCB not to boycott the match against India. "Pakistan should not boycott, but wear black arm-bands and play the India game," Basit said on his *YouTube* channel *Basit Ali Show*. Basit also questioned the timing of any potential boycott. "Why wait for the February 15 India vs Pakistan game at the T20 World Cup? If you have to boycott, do it on February 1 during the Pakistan vs India U-19 World Cup match," he said. ICC sources told *The Indian Express* that if Pakistan decides to boycott the T20 World Cup or withdraw from the tournament, the ICC could impose sanctions. These could include suspension of bilateral series and exclusion from the Asia Cup.

Bumrah effect: India's ultimate trump card for T20 World Cup

Premier pacer is redefining fast bowling in shortest format with unmatched versatility, precision

JASPRIT BUMRAH is not just a bowler who executes plans—he's the plan itself. As teams prepare their strategies for the T20 World Cup, they'll face an unsolvable riddle: How do you plan for a bowler who can bowl anywhere, anytime, and deliver magic with every ball? A couple of Kiwis found that out on Monday.

Tim Seifert stood at the crease, his reputation as one of T20 cricket's most explosive openers—boasting a strike rate of 142.66—preceding him. The New Zealand wicketkeeper-batsman wasn't attempting anything reckless. He was simply playing the line. Then Jasprit Bumrah happened.

One delivery. That's all it took. The ball landed on a good length just outside off-stump at 137 kmph, swung in 0.3 degrees with the angle, prompting Seifert to commit.

Then it seamed away 0.8 degrees—a subtle but devastating deviation that sent the off-stump cartwheeling. Seifert hurried back to the pavilion, another victim of Bumrah's extraordinary craft.

Art of deception

To the naked eye, the delivery that dismissed Seifert in the third T20I at Guwahati didn't appear extraordinary at first glance. But television replays revealed the brutal truth: Seifert had been completely outfoxed. He isn't alone. Babar Azam and Muhammad Rizwan have found their defenses breached in similarly spectacular fashion by Bumrah. The dismissal evoked memories of

Wasim Akram's magic against Rahul Dravid at the famous Chennai Test in 1999. But Bumrah is conjuring this wizardry in T20 cricket—a format where margins are razor-thin and batsmen are supposed to dominate.

While India's breathtaking acceleration with the bat has reinforced why they're top favourites to defend their T20 World Cup title, their bowling unit—despite rotation—has been equally impressive.

They defended totals at Nagpur despite dew, limited New Zealand to 208/6 on a flat Raipur deck, and delivered another clinical performance at Guwahati. The damage started by Harshit Rana was completed by Bumrah, returning figures of 4-0-17-3.

Ultimate weapon

What makes Bumrah invaluable is his unparalleled versatility. He can bowl with the new ball, in the second half of the powerplay, through the middle overs, and definitively at the death. In an era obsessed with match-ups, Bumrah's entry point keeps opponents perpetually guessing.

"I'm happy as far as I'm able to contribute," Bumrah reflected after receiving the Man of the Match award. "If the team wants me to bowl with the new ball, I'm more than happy. If they want me to bowl in the end, I'm happy to do that. I did that in the Asia Cup as well. That was a new role for me—bowling three overs in the powerplay. But as a team, we have to be flexible. So I'm flexible as well."

That flexibility is a luxury most teams can only dream of.

While captains typically seek versatility in their batting ranks, Bumrah's sensational form offers India a unique tactical advantage. At Guwahati, he entered as second change in the sixth over—the second half of the powerplay when batsmen are desperate to maximize field restrictions. His impact was immediate and devastating.

Perfect storm

Bumrah's liberation stems from the strength around him. With Arshdeep Singh exploit-

ing the new ball, Hardik Pandya fit and firing, the skiddy Harshit Rana providing backup, and the spin duo of Varun Chakravathy and Kuldeep Yadav dominating the middle overs, captain Suryakumar Yadav can deploy Bumrah's four overs wherever the game demands.

And when Bumrah takes the ball, he possesses enough variations to adapt to any situation. While his yorker remains his most lethal weapon, his good-length delivery is equally poisonous—particularly in

subcontinental conditions with dew factored in.

Science of Skid

Bumrah's unique bowling action, featuring hyperextension of the elbow, means his good-length deliveries naturally skid through—arriving quicker than they appear. Add even slight seam movement or swing, and what looks driveable at release becomes a delivery with the batsman's name written on it.

Seifert perhaps paid the price by standing rooted to the crease, but with that pacy skidding weapon tailing in, he can't be blamed. Later, Kyle Jamieson attempted to play off the back foot and lost his leg stump. In the dressing room afterward, both would have realized the cruel truth: those deliveries offered no correct response—neither forward nor back.

That length, when dragged slightly back, becomes the hardest for batsmen to clear the boundary. And even when batsmen believe they've adapted, Bumrah produces another trick from his sleeve—a well-disguised slower ball that's almost impossible to pick.

While spinners Varun Chakravathy and Kuldeep Yadav provide X-factor options, Bumrah offers something even rarer in modern T20 cricket: complete control across all phases of the game, regardless of match situation.

His ability to swing momentum, break partnerships, and deliver in pressure moments makes him India's ultimate trump card. In the format that supposedly belongs to batsmen, one man is rewriting the rules with a cricket ball in hand—proving that even in the most explosive era of the game, quality will always trump power. In a team brimming with match-winners, Bumrah could well be the one that wins them the T20 World Cup.

How Kishan's early intent is powering India's powerplays

WHEN SANJU Samson fell on the very first ball in the third T20I against New Zealand at Guwahati on Sunday, the Kiwi bowlers felt they had a foot in the door. What they may not have accounted for was the "Ishan Kishan effect."

The left-hander doesn't treat scorecards like 0/1 and 6/2 as a crisis right now, but as an opportunity to disrupt. By facing 13 of the next 19 balls in the third T20I, he protected Abhishek Sharma, allowing the youngster to find his feet while the scoreboard raced to a record-breaking 50 in 19 balls.

Earlier at Raipur, India was in deep trouble at 6/2, chasing a massive 209. Instead of retreating, Kishan went into overdrive. By the time the powerplay was over, Kishan had already blazed to 56 runs.

How did Kishan steer the 3.1 overs?

Ishan Kishan faced 13 out of

the 19 balls and made 28 runs, while Abhishek Sharma faced the remaining six deliveries and made 23 runs in this phase of the innings.

- Kishan: 0, 6, 6, 4, 0, 4, 0, 1, 2, 0, 1, 4, out
- Abhishek: 6, 1, 4, 2, 4, 6

What was the boundary split during these 3.1 overs?

The duo hit a combined nine boundary shots to propel the

score to 53/2. Kishan smashed three fours and two sixes while Abhishek hit two fours and two sixes in this phase.

E. How has Kishan's powerplay batting helped India recover from early wickets?

With Tilak Varma recovering from injury, Kishan has batted at number three in each of the last three T20Is. The southpaw's exploits in the

last two T20Is have been game-changing. In the third T20I, after Samson fell for a first-ball duck, Kishan immediately counter-attacked, scoring 16 off his first five balls, and ensured New Zealand couldn't build on the momentum of that early wicket.

In the second T20I, India were 6/1 chasing 209 and were soon 6/2 the following over when Abhishek fell for a first-ball duck. Kishan took total control of this state of despair, scoring 56 in the next 25 balls during the powerplay, single-handedly powering India to 75/2 by the end of the six overs.

The fireworks from Kishan sparked praise from captain Suryakumar Yadav. "I've never seen anyone bat at 6 for 2 in that manner and still end the powerplay around 67 or 70. Chasing 200 or 210, this is what we want from batters," Surya said at the post-match presentation, after the win.

What is the significance of Kishan's strike rate from first two balls?

Ever since he first played for India in 2021, Kishan has carried a mindset where he looks to hit his first ball for a boundary or a six. He hit a four on his first-ever T20I ball that he faced and a six off the first ball he faced in ODIs. In this series, his strike rate across his first two deliveries have been consistently above 200, a psychological tactic that has pushed New Zealand on the backfoot despite taking early wickets.

How has this aggressive powerplay approach helped other batters like Suryakumar Yadav?

By bossing the powerplay on Sunday, Kishan and Abhishek effectively killed the required run rate early. When Surya arrived, the pressure was non-existent. In the third T20I, the asking rate was so low that the India captain could play his natural, creative game without risk and finished with an unbeaten 57 off 26 balls and ensured the hosts won with 10 overs to spare.

Sciver-Brunt makes history as champions power past RCB

SYNOPSIS: Sciver-Brunt scores WPL's first-ever century, leads MI to first win in four in boost to their playoff hopes.

A MONSTER middle overs partnership—one that saw the Women's Premier League's first-ever century come from the bat of England skipper Nat Sciver-Brunt—followed by table-toppers Royal Challengers Bengaluru (RCB) losing their top-order for 40 runs, allowed Mumbai Indians to pump life into their playoff hopes on Monday in Vadodra.

Nat stabilises first

When MI skipper Harmanpreet Kaur said at the toss she

would have fielded if she won, the thought tracked with the Vadodra pitch that has seen the ball coming on to the bat slowly. That thought may have gained further weight when Mumbai struggled to get out of the blocks—a persistent issue this season—and produced only 38 from the powerplay overs.

But Sciver-Brunt first held the fort with Hayley Matthews after Lauren Bell foxed Sajeevan Sajana with a delivery that stayed straight and rapped her on the pad. And once they had steadied the innings at 75/1 after ten overs, they went hunting for boundaries. Bell was the only bowler who had an economy rate under 10, as Brunt and Matthews picked everyone apart.

Sciver-Brunt's international strike rate stays a shade under

120, her WPL SR bumps up to just over 144. Against RCB, she hit 100 off 57 balls, accelerating in the middle overs with no real questions posed. The partnership (131 from 73 balls) came to

an end when captain Mandhana brought Bell into the attack, who took Matthews (56 from 39 balls) out of the equation. But then a 12-ball-20-run cameo from Harmanpreet

followed. MI, who had lost their last three games, found the partnerships they were missing and posted an above-par target of 200 with Sciver-Brunt remaining unbeaten with a historic century—her first-ever in the T20 format.

Top half disorder

Any hopes of Bengaluru living up to the form they have shown through most of the season fizzled out within the powerplay as Matthews, who had excelled with the bat, took out Smriti Mandhana, Georgia Voll and Radha Yadav in a clutch two-over spell. On the other end, Shabnim Ismail took the all-important wicket of RCB's power-hitter Grace Smith, who gave away the faintest of edges at the end of a nine-ball stay and then picked up RCB's latest find Gautami Naik.

Five wickets and forty runs—Ismail and Matthews wrecked Bengaluru's batting lineup.

For a brief moment there was hope that Nadine de Klerk and Richa Ghosh—so impactful for South Africa and India at the World Cup—would possibly steady the ship. But Amelia Kerr removed de Klerk from the mix and despite Ghosh and Shreyanka Patil smashing 27 from the penultimate over, the task of 32 from the final six balls was a bit too much for the duo to salvage.

FORMER INDIA Test captain Ajinkya Rahane has said that head coach Gautam Gambhir should probably consider staying away from social media as much as possible until the end of the 2026 T20 World Cup. Rahane expressed the opinion while talking about Gambhir's recent exchange with Congress Member of Parliament Shashi Tharoor on the social media platform 'X'. Gambhir had sarcastically criticised those that think that the coach has "unlimited authority".

"My only response to this is, GG should stay away from social media," said Rahane on *Cricbuzz*. "Probably not think too much about what people are talking about him or telling him. He played cricket in a great

manner and now he is coaching India which is a very responsible job. That's my personal opinion, something that even I used to do. Stay away from social media and focus the big event that's coming, till the World Cup is over." The 2026 T20 World Cup starts on February 7.

Tharoor had posted a picture with Gambhir, saying that he met the former India opener in Nagpur, where the team had played their first T20I against New Zealand on Wednesday. India won the match by 48 runs and have taken a 1-0 lead in the five-match series.

"When the dust settles, truth & logic about a coach's supposedly 'unlimited authority' will become clear. Till then I'm amused at being pitted against my own who are the very best!" Gambhir wrote in response to Tharoor's post.

Sh*t happens: Gukesh on his blunders

“SHIT HAPPENS.” That was world champion Gukesh’s frank assessment about his stunning blunder two rounds ago in the game against arch-rival Nodirbek Abdusattorov at the Tata Steel Chess tournament in Wijk aan Zee.

The blunder, in an equalish position, meant that Gukesh would immediately lose a pawn and then a rook, and would be likely checkmated later on in the game. Gukesh had resigned from the game soon afterwards, and had also lost to Anish Giri the next day before finally bouncing back with a victory over Vladimir Fedoseev with black pieces on Sunday in round 8.

Gukesh had seemed inconsolable in the aftermath of the result against Abdusattorov, spending five minutes at the table speechless even as the Uzbekistan grandmaster tried to engage him in conversation and analyse the game. Later, Gukesh had walked into the press room at the tournament venue where he had spent another 10 to 15 minutes in silence with his face turned away from the world as he tried to come to terms with the blunder.

Speaking about the incident after he managed to defeat Fedoseev on Sunday, a smiling Gukesh said: “The best part about the blunder is that I can’t not even explain how it happened. In a way, those kinds of blunders are perhaps easier to handle than the ones you can actually explain. This just happens—I mean, shit happens—it’s what happened. After that, I managed to move on. I think the more painful game was the one against Anish Giri (in round 7) because I was just completely off; I played one of my worst games in quite a while. It’s been a good challenge: After two losses, I still have to play good chess, and I’ve managed to do that,” Gukesh told the YouTube channel of Tata Steel Chess tournament in an interview on Sunday after his win.

Abdusattorov had struck a sympathetic note after winning against Gukesh, even as he called the blunder “unexplainable.” “I feel very sorry for him. It’s a terrible feeling. I’ve done it myself many times. So it’s an absolutely horrible feeling,” a sympathetic Abdusattorov said in an interview with the YouTube channel of Tata Steel Chess tournament after his win. “This game was pretty much normal. At some point I think he was getting excited and he was obviously trying to push but I sort of controlled the margin. I thought I had a good margin to draw and at the end he was getting low on time and he felt nervous and he blundered horribly.”

After two losses in a row, the game against Fedoseev provided some respite to the world champion.

TWO-TIME defending champion Jannik Sinner beat compatriot Luciano Darderi 6-1, 6-3, 7-6 (2) two days after admitting he felt lucky to survive the third round.

Sinner struggled with the extreme heat and cramping in his Saturday afternoon win over No. 85-ranked Eliot Spizzirri, and only took control of that match after the roof was closed in the third set.

His evening match Monday was much cooler, and so was Sinner. He served a personal best 19 aces and improved his streak to 18 straight wins at Melbourne Park. The Italian star next faces No. 8-seeded Ben Shelton, who beat No. 12 Casper Ruud 3-6, 6-4, 6-3, 6-4 in a night match. Sinner has won his last eight meetings with the 23-year-old American, including last year’s semifinal here.

Another Italian, Lorenzo Musetti, reached the quarterfinals for the first time in Australia with a 6-2, 7-5, 6-4 win over an ailing Taylor Fritz.

It completed a Grand Slam set of quarterfinals for the 23-year-old Italian. The fifth-seeded Musetti has had a disrupted run, with members of his support team having to return home for personal reasons. He also had to leave his family behind after the birth in November of his second son.

“I feel more mature on the court. I’m playing better for that, and for them,” he said. His next mission is against a rested Novak Djokovic. The 24-time major winner was scheduled to be the feature night match

Monday but instead had a walkover into the quarterfinals. Heat is on With a forecast maximum temperature of 45 degrees Celsius (113 Fahrenheit) on Tuesday, organizers planned to open the gates early for fans.

All-American quarters

Jessica Pegula knocked podcast pal and defending champion Madison Keys out of the Australian Open on Monday to secure a quarterfinal against Amanda Anisimova, another all-American match.

Their fourth-round wins on Day 9 means four Americans have reached the women’s singles last eight in Australia for the first time since 2001, when Serena and Venus Williams, Jennifer Capriati, Monica Seles and Lindsay Davenport made it through.

It is also the first time the top six seeds in the women’s and men’s singles have all qualified for the last eight of a Grand Slam event in the Open Era. “Sucks that one American has to go out in the quarterfinals,” Anisimova said.

No. 6-seeded Pegula had a slightly different take: “At least one of us will get through and I think that’s great for American tennis. Yeah, it’s been pretty crazy how well the women have been doing and how many top-ranked girls there are. I’m just happy to be a part of that conversation.”

Pegula and No. 4 Anisimova advanced a day after No. 3 Coco Gauff and 18-year-old Iva Jovic earned their places on the other side of the draw.

Pegula’s 6-3, 6-4 win at Rod Laver Arena ended Keys’ first

No. 2 Iga Swiatek continued her quest to complete a career Grand Slam with a 6-0, 6-3 win over home qualifier Maddison Inglis, giving the center court crowd little to cheer on the Australia Day national holiday.

Swiatek next meets No. 5 Elena Rybakina, runner-up to Aryna Sabalenka here in 2023.

Pegula is in the quarterfinals for the fourth time in Australia but has never previously gone further at the season-opening major. Anisimova is in the last eight here for the first time.

“I have been seeing, hitting, moving, I feel very well this whole tournament, and to be able to keep that up against such a great player as Maddie and defending champion was going to be a lot tougher of a task today,” Pegula said. “I was still able to do that really well.”

Pegula and Keys had played three times previously, and Keys had won the last two. But on Monday it was Pegula who dominated, racing to 4-1 leads in both sets.

“I felt if I didn’t hit a really good ball immediately, she was in charge of the points,” Keys said. “I was kind of struggling to kind of get that dominance back.”

Pegula’s best performance in a major was reaching the U.S. Open final in 2024. Men’s draw Three Italian men started Day 9. Only two could advance.

KALINGA LANCERS edged past Ranchi Royals 3-2 in a gripping final to lift the men’s Hockey India League (HIL) title in front of a partisan home crowd at the Kalinga Hockey Stadium in Bhubaneswar on Monday.

Put under extreme pressure in the closing stages, the Lancers held their nerve in a high-quality contest to secure the championship, with Alexander Hendrickx and Dilpreet Singh delivering the decisive goals. Hendrickx struck twice (4', 27') through his trademark dragflicks, while Dilpreet Singh (25') added a crucial goal from close range.

Ranchi Royals fought until the very end, finding the net through Arajjeet Singh Hundal (9') and captain Tom Boon (59'), but ultimately fell just short in a pulsating finish.

Both teams began the final with intensity, pressing high and creating early circle entries as they looked to assert control. The Lancers struck first in the fourth minute after earning back-to-back penalty corners. Hendrickx stepped up and unleashed a fierce dragkick that beat Ranchi Royals goalkeeper Suraj Karkera to give the hosts an early advantage.

Ranchi Royals responded swiftly and in style. In the ninth minute, Yashdeep Siwach produced a clever aerial pass from the left flank to switch play, finding Arajjeet Singh Hundal inside the circle. Hundal showed excellent control to bring the ball down before smashing a powerful shot past the goalkeeper to restore parity.

The second quarter proved decisive as Vedanta Kalinga Lancers seized control. While Ranchi Royals continued to show attacking intent, a series of penalty corners swung momentum firmly in the Lancers’ favour. In the 25th minute, Hendrickx’s dragkick was in-

itially saved, but Dilpreet Singh reacted quickest to the rebound, calmly slotting the ball home. Just two minutes later, Hendrickx converted another penalty corner, firing a thunderous dragkick into the top right corner to give the Lancers a 3-1 lead at halftime.

Ranchi Royals dominated possession in the third quarter and pushed hard to get back into the contest. Captain Tom Boon saw his penalty-corner effort blocked by the first rusher, while Arajjeet Singh Hundal came close again late in the quarter only to be denied by an excellent save from goalkeeper Krishan Bahadur Pathak.

The Royals threw everything forward in the final quarter, but Pathak produced a series of outstanding saves, denying Sam Lane, Boon and Nilam Sanjeev Xess. Boon finally pulled one back from a penalty corner in the 59th minute, but time ran out as Vedanta Kalinga Lancers held on to claim a memorable HIL title triumph at home.

The Hockey India League also announced a total prize purse of Rs 6 Crore following the final. The champions, Kalinga Lancers, received Rs 3 Crore, while runners-up Ranchi Royals took home Rs 2 Crore. Hyderabad Toofans, who defeated HIL GC earlier in the day to finish third, were awarded Rs 1 Crore.

In a high-scoring thriller, Amandeep Lakra (30', 53') bagged a brace with Nilakanta Sharma (24') and Jacob Anderson (33') also getting on the scoresheet for the Toofans. Meanwhile, Sam Ward (14', 52') scored twice with Kane Russell (55') were on target for HIL GC.

Among individual award winners, Tamil Nadu Dragons goalkeeper Prince Deep Singh was named Best Goalkeeper of the Tournament, while Talem Priyobarta of HIL GC won the Upcoming Player of the Tournament award. Both players received Rs 10 Lakh each. Ranchi Royals skipper Boon finished as the Top Scorer of the Tournament with 19 goals and was also awarded Rs 10 Lakh.

Hyderabad Toofans’ Amandeep Lakra was crowned the Player of the Tournament and received Rs 20 Lakh.

Not going to answer what happens next: Carrick

MANCHESTER UNITED’S stand-in manager Michael Carrick continued his dream start to his second stint in the position with victory at Arsenal on Sunday and said his team must ride the wave of confidence that has swept away the Old Trafford gloom.

Carrick answered United’s call in the wake of Ruben Amorim’s sacking and his two games in charge have seen a 2-0 win against Manchester City and a thrilling 3-2 victory at leaders Arsenal. “We’ve got to ride it and use the emotion, you have got to use the energy and use the confidence,” Carrick, whose team moved up to fourth, said. “You have got to be humble enough to understand how we could just achieve these two big results.”

United had to dig deep on Sunday as Arsenal bossed the opening half-hour and led through a Lisandro Martinez own goal. But Bryan Mbeumo was gifted an equaliser and stunning goals by Patrick Dorgu and Matheus Cunha in the second half sealed a first United league win at Arsenal

Football’s perennial ingratitude towards caretaker managers

THE AWAY end at the Emirates Stadium chanted Michael Carrick’s name. The players leapt into Carrick’s embrace into the final whistle blew, capping a liberating victory for the beleaguered Manchester United over league toppers Arsenal.

There was newfound joy and bounce in their game, there was renewed optimism among their fans. After Ruben Amorim’s rigid reign, the old midfield warhorse, the caretaker manager, has instilled a sense of belief that had eluded the faithfuls with successive wins over Manchester City and Arsenal in London, the first time in nine seasons.

Yet, club legend Roy Keane quipped that even if Carrick were to win the remaining games, he wouldn’t make his job permanent. “If United win every game until the end of the season, I still wouldn’t be giving him the job. I still wouldn’t be convinced he’s the man for the job. Absolutely not,” he would say. The observation offered a glimpse into the thankless world of caretakers, or “interim managers”, as is the phrase in

vogue these days.

It’s both a cruel and rewarding world. If the caretaker does a credible job, his reputation is enhanced, he might fetch a handsome job elsewhere. Yet at the end of the season, their brief tenure ends with a warm handshake, a “thank you” note and a hefty reward. A bigger manager lands up next year.

The caretaker, often, ends up in a smaller club, a mid-table or promoted side, or a Championship side. Some of them become crisis specialists, hired to stave off relegation or a mid-table slump. There would be no dearth of jobs, there would always be a club in crisis.

Carrick has tasted it once, when he managed the club briefly but successfully after the ouster of Ole Gunnar Solskjaer. He soon found a job with Middlesbrough, where he spent three futile seasons fighting for promotion.

History, perhaps, is a source of cynicism. In 34 Premier League seasons, only 21 caretaker managers had their job made permanent. Of those only a handful enjoyed reasonable success. Chelsea’s Roberto Di Matteo’s name strikes first. Taking over the London club from

Andre Villas-Boas, he steered Chelsea to their maiden Champions League, the Holy Grail for then owner Roman Abramovich. He was furnished a two-year contract, but was fired by November next season after league failings.

Bolstering the sense of foreboding when making an interim coach permanent is that only one of these 21 has ever lasted a full season after landing the permanent job, betraying the general distrust of stopgaps.

There had been exceptions

too. Like Fulham’s Chris Coleman in the early aughts. He helped the Cottagers out of relegation and was appointed manager next season, when he was only 32. He lasted four seasons. Fulham’s Scot Parker is another tale of success. Or slipping further back, Aston Villa’s Tony Parker, who engineered their European Cup triumph.

The grandest success story involves the Brazilian legend Mario Zagallo. A shrewd tactician and an industrious winger, who invented the deep-lying winger role, his reappointment

as Brazil’s manager before the 1970 World Cup was funnily fascinating. His predecessor, João Saldanha, was a journalist, who managed part-time. The story goes that he was made the manager so that the scrutinising Brazilian media at that time would be softer in their criticisms. Saldanha’s swaggering side stored through the World Cup qualifiers, winning all six games and belting 23 goals. But he committed the blasphemy of announcing that he would drop Pele from the squad, citing that his eyesight was deteriorating.

A communist in the era of dictator Emilio Garrastazu Médici, he snubbed the latter’s recommendation of picking his favourite Dario. The brazen manager, the rumour goes, brandished a gun at a journalist during a press conference.
